

TRUCKING BAN LIFTED FROM ALL COUNTY ROADS WITH WARMER WEATHER

The ban on trucking on county roads was lifted Monday by the Lane County Court and hauling under the weight limits will not be restricted further this spring unless there is a radical change in the weather.

The roads of Lane county were all declared to be in very good shape by M. G. Thompson, county weight supervisor, and Oscar Cutler, state market road engineer, after an inspection of the highways last Friday. There has been considerable interest shown by county commissioners from other counties over the manner in which the Lane county oiled roads stood up during the recent cold weather.

The fine condition of the oiled highways following the low temperatures is accountable to the fact that a sheet of ice formed over the roads and this prevented the frost from cracking and otherwise raising havoc with the surface, thinks Mr. Cutler.

Coming at the same time as the opening of the county roads to traffic was an announcement from Roy Klein chief engineer of the state highway department, that the weight limits on two state highways in Lane county were to be reduced to eight tons. The Siuslaw highway between Low Pass summit and Cheshire, and the Goshen-Lowell section of the Willamette highway are the roads affected by the order.

The Goshen-Lowell section of the Willamette highway includes the portion of the road from a point seven-tenths of a mile west of Pleasant Hill to within eight-tenths of a mile of Dexter.

The load limit on this section is now 6000 pounds including the weight of the truck.

The order was made to prevent the cracking of the surface of the two highways and will be rescinded as soon as weather permits states Mr. Klein.

The closing of the county roads to trucks caused several of the sawmills not located on the railroad to close down during the past two weeks as they could not haul out their manufactured lumber, states H. J. Cox, secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's Association. Most of the mills resumed operation again this week when the ban was lifted.

Mill Employee Ill—Tom Rathbun who is employed at the Booth-Kelly lumber mill was ill the latter part of last week.
