COUNTY AGENT URGES THAT FARMERS PLANT HOME GROWN CLOVER

Lane county farmers interested in planting red clover for hay and pasture should give preference to locally grown seed, according to the county agent, O. S. Fletcher

The county agent issued this statement when he learned that many Lane county farmers think that he and other representatives of the Oregon Agricultural college are recommeding that farmers plant nothing but Ohio red clover seed. The Ohio seed is recommended for spe cial seed growers only.

Re-Established Seed Here In order to help re-esetablish the red clover seed industry of the Willamette valley, three Willamette valley wholesale seed dealers purchased carload of an especially hardy strain of Ohio red clover and shipped it to Oregon during January for resale at cost. This seed was located and approved by Prof. G. R. Hyslop, head of the farm crops department of the Oregon Agricultural college and was also approved by Dr. George Pieters, Forage Crop specialist of the United States department of agri-

The Ohio seed was brought to Ore gon upon request of leading red clovalley, who attended a conference held at the agricultural college last July to discuss the red clover seed production industry. It was brought out at that meeting that Willamette have been received at the office of valley red clover seed has not given good results in the eastern part of the United States, and that a hardy strain must be developed here.

Much Seed Purchased
