**COUNTY FARM PROGRAM PLANS ARE OUTLINED AT COUNCIL MEETING**

Lane county agricultural programs for 1930 in farm crops, dairying, horticulture, poultry, general livestock and rodent control were prepared by project committees of the Lane county agricultural council at a special meeting held in Eugene last week. Copies have been mailed to all farm organizations with the request that they cooperate along the lines suggested and that at least one meeting every month be devoted to some agricultural program. Brief summaries of the programs are given below:

**Farm Crops**  
Promote the production of better yields of high quality cereals by standardizing on Victory and gray winter oats; Jenkin, white winter, Rink, Red Huston, and Zimmermann wheat; and Hanchen and O. A. C. No. 7 barley.

Continue work on alfalfa by pooling orders for seed, holding field meetings and tours to discuss alfalfa production problems, and starting additional demonstrations on growing alfalfa on limed land.

Assist in reestablishing red clover seed industry by introduction of hardy clover seed.

Follow up weed control demonstrations started in 1929 and start additional demonstrations on control of weeds with chemicals.

Promote growing of Austrian winter peas as a seed crop to displace grain crops. Demonstrate value of this crop for cover crops and forage in Lane county.

Assist potato growers by introducing and growing certified seed of standard varieties, and by conducting demonstrations on use of 6-7-8 fertilizer in the valley and superphosphate in the coast section in growing potatoes.

Help farmers organize lime and fertilizer pools.

Conduct demonstrations on growing vetch and clover on limed land.

Establish rust resistant at nursery on coast.

Demonstrate value of superphosphate in growing root crops.

Start additional pasture demonstrations in both valley and coast sections.

**Horticulture**  
Continue campaigns to interest cherry growers in grafting non-bearing trees with pollenizing varieties, and in control of cherry fruit flies.

Conduct demonstrations on control of brown rot and thrips on prunes and cherries with dusts.

Carry on fertilizer trials on prunes, cherries, apples, walnuts, and truck crops.

Work for production of prunes of larger size and better quality.

Conduct pruning demonstrations, hold miscellaneous timely meetings and carry on special demonstrations to promote interests of fruit growers.

Hold irrigation tour.

**Dairying**  
Organize a cow testing association and at least one abortion control area. Conduct a scrub bull survey, encourage production and use of better forage crops, assist breed promotion associations, encourage larger herds, render assistance on financing problems, and emphasize importance of high quality products. Carry on campaign to encourage greater consumption of dairy products.

**General Livestock**  
Conduct one sheep dipping vat as a demonstration, hold a meeting to discuss sheep management problems, and encourage carrying of more goats to clean up brush land. Make a survey to determine feasibility of producing more hogs in the county. Revise directory of breeders of purebred livestock and maintain "for sale" and "exchange" service, and study means of controlling infectious abortion in

**Poultry**

Conduct tour in March to study chicken brooding equipment and problems, hold four culling demonstrations in August, and hold four general poultry meetings in fall.

Conduct a one-day turkey institute on March 5, conduct demonstrations to compare artificial brooding of turkeys with the hen method, conduct demonstrations on control of summer colds of turkeys, hold turkey tour in early fall, conduct two turkey killing demonstrations, and continue work to lessen thefts of all kinds of poultry.

**Rodent Control**  
Carry on campaign against ground squirrels, conduct four gopher control demonstrations on an area basis, work for greater interest in gopher control, and assist farmers on rat control problems.
