MANY NEW FAMILIES ARRIVE IN OREGON

Oregon gained 61 families during February, who bought 22,905 acres of land and invested \$295,400, according to the report of W. G. Ide, manager, State Chamber of Commerce. February this year far surpassed the same month of 1929 when 11 families made Oregon their home and bought 752 acres of land and invested \$22,300. The report also points out that 212 families wrote of their intentions to move to Oregon this coming summer and they would have over one million dollars for investment purposes. During the month 3315 families have answered the State Chamber's advertising, asking for information about all parts of the state. Over 15,000 pieces of Oregon literature and letters were mailed to these families.
