NEW WELLS TO AID CITY WATER SUPPL'

Development Program at Power House Calls for Sinking of Several More Wells Along the Raceway During Summer; New Well is Completed.

The drilling of another 100 foot well at the power plant of the Mountain EVERYTHING IS READY States Power company last week marks the first step to be taken this year in the gradual development of the local water supply both in quanthey and quality.

This brought the total number of present plans call for the sinking of several more wells during the coming summer months. Most of the wells are located near the race, but the latest one to be brought in is along the south side of the power

First Wells Last Year

Six of the wells were sunk last year and they marked the first attempt to take water for the city of Springfield from underground. Previous to the drilling of the wells, all of the water used in Springfield had been taken from the raceway and pumped up to the large tank on the butte south of the plant.

The river water is pure and safe enough for domestic purposes, according to L. E. Danks, but frequently the water in the river becomes muddy especially when the snow melts, and late in the summer when the water level drops. Then the wells are needed to supply a flow of clear water. The well water is colder and has a better taste.

Wells Unable to Produce Sufficient The average daily consumption is now about 120,000 gallons, and this amount is nearly doubled during the dry summer months when the gardeners irrigate their crops and lawns.
