COLONIAL ART EXHIBIT TO BE AT SCHOOL HERE

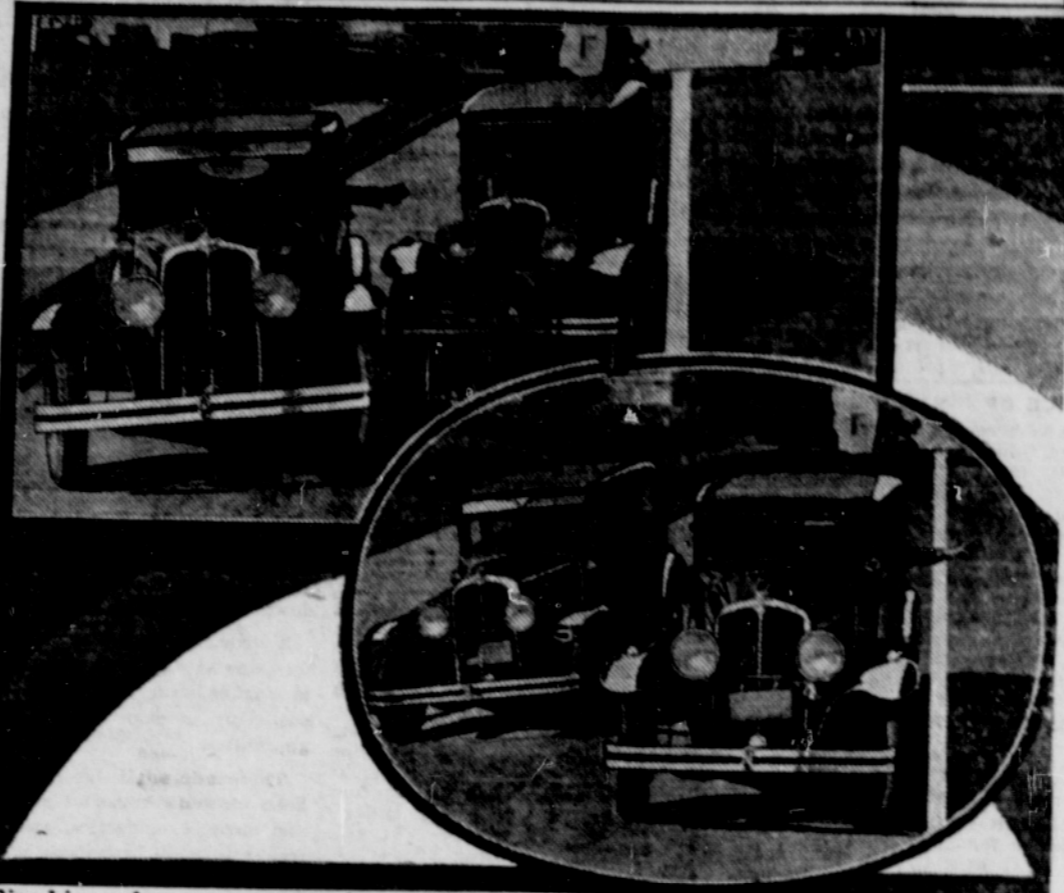
An exhibition of Colonial art paintings will be held at the Lincoln school all of next week, according to an announcement made yesterday by Laurence Moffitt, principal.
