MANY GROWERS SIGNED VEGETABLE CONTRACTS

More than 100 acres of vegetables had been signed for at that time. The approximate acreage of pears is 400 acres; of prunes—2000 acres; and of cherries 400 acres. It is too early to determine very much about the forthcoming vegetable crop, says cannery officials, but they anticipate a very heavy prune and cherry crop.

Installation of new machinery, repair of the prune dryers and other machinery is now under way in preparation for the fruit and vegetables which will soon be brought to the cannery.

GIRLS AT HIGH SCHOOL GIVEN EXAMINATIONS TO DETERMINE HEALTH

A complete card record of the health and physical condition of every girl now enrolled in the Springfield high school will soon be completed and filed in the office of the girls' advisor, Mrs. William Baker where it can be referred to at any time by those persons who have any necessity of investigating such information. Students in the women's physical education department at the University have volunteered their services and have already completed a tabulation of the weight, height, and habits of each girl student here. The cards, which they have filled out, also contain a report of the condition of the students' eyes, a history of their previous health, and a notation as to the posture of the individual.

The county health officer, Dr. Gregson, and the nurse, Miss Gavin, have taken tests of the lungs, heart, and skin conditions of most of the girls. The few remaining girls will be examined Friday morning.

All of this vital information will be kept strictly confidential except in instances where a student is found to be suffering from some ailment or defect. Their parents will be notified. The information will always be available for the parents, states Mrs. Baker, although that is not the real purpose of the examinations.

The real purpose of the work is to provide the faculty advisor of the girls with some very useful information about their charges which can be consulted and used in remedying defects in the individual's actions or physical structure.

The work was started at the instigation of Mrs. Baker, who declares that she felt the lack of necessary information in assisting girls who are under her care at school.

SURVEY TESTS GIVEN STUDENTS IN H. S. HERE

Dr. C. L. Huffaker, of the department of education at the University spent Wednesday morning at the Springfield high school giving students there a series of survey tests. The tests are both mental and psychological, and will be given to all of the students in the upper grades at the other schools also.

Dr. Huffaker is also making a survey of the various buildings used for school purposes in this vicinity. He examines them to determine their adaptability to the purpose for which they are being used. The entire work is a part of a state-wide project, funds for which were provided at the last session of the legislature.
