

**McKENZIE PASS GAINS EARLY TOURIST FAVOR**

The number of automobiles now crossing the McKenzie Pass daily has already mounted to figures higher than has been hoped for by the individuals who have been advocating a year-around traffic over the Cascade mountains between Springfield and Bend.

A check of the traffic over the pass shows that 383 cars crossed the mountains the first eight days of the road was open and this day before it was officially opened by the highway department. The records also show that 139 cars crossed the pass the first Sunday it was opened. Of this number 60 went east and 79 came toward Springfield. Nine of the cars counted that day bore out-of-state license plates.

**HIGHWAY CLEANUP WORK TO BE ORGANIZED HERE**

All communities in Lane county are now busy making preparations for the State Highway Cleanup day which has been proclaimed for May 10, by Governor A. W. Norblad. He has called upon all civic organizations in the state to aid in the work. The initial idea for such a movement came from the State Federation of Garden Clubs.

The work in this vicinity is being prepared by a committee from the Women's Civic club, consisting of Mrs. I. M. Peterson and Mrs. A. B. Van Valzah, who are working with the Chamber of Commerce. Just what work will be done in this vicinity will be decided by the representatives of the two organizations.

The workers, which will consist of boy scouts, service club members, school children, and numerous others, will assemble at mile posts at 8:30. They will be put under leaders and will clean stretches of one mile of the state highway. All workers are urged to bring a rake for pulling dead grass and other debris left by the winter into small piles. Four tined pitch forks will be of use also. Shovels, spades and a few pruning hooks can be, also used.

**NORBLAD AIDS ALL VETERANS**

Veteran legislation has always received strong support from Governor Norblad. During his four terms in the state senate he not only gave his support to veteran legislation but in two sessions he was author and co-author of three measures for veterans.

Governor Norblad was a co-author of the Bonus Loan Bill which provided for the formation of the World War Veterans State Aid Commission. At the 1929 session of the legislature he voted to extend the loan privilege to veterans who have resided in the State of Oregon for 10 years.

Research by Irl S. McSherry, private secretary to the governor, shows that while state senator, Governor Norblad voted for nine bills and three other veteran measures in the 1919 session, seven bills and three other measures in the 1921 session, 10 bills and one other measure in the 1927 session, and seven bills and one other measure at the 1929 session.

**LAST MINUTE MESSAGES URGING LUMBER TARIFF WANTED AT WASHINGTON**

A request for many last minute telegrams to be sent to the representatives at Washington urging the passage of the tariff measure now before Congress, is now being made by the Emergency committee. Lumber and Shingle Tariff. The letter received here states that the bill will be voted upon Friday or Saturday, and every telegram from back home will aid in swinging support for the backers.

"We are gaining ground now daily. We need your support now more than ever before. No matter how many wires you have already sent, send more, and if possible get civic bodies and men in other lines of business to wire also. Your wires alone may not look big to you, but when the entire lumber industry of the United States wires and they all come to the desks of the congressmen within a period of 48 hours, the lumber industry speaks with a voice that can be heard."

**AUTOMOBILES COLLIDE ON STREET HERE FRIDAY**

Two automobile accidents were reported at the city hall last Friday within a half hour. The first one occurred when L. H. Morehouse, local farmer, started to turn into an alley with his Pontiac and was struck sideways by another car being driven by Arlo Johansen, route 1. Johansen gave his age as 15 in the report at the police station.

The second accident involved a telephone company truck and an automobile belonging to H. P. Harkensen, of Junction City. According to the accident reports filed at the city hall, Harkensen was pulling out from the curb when the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company truck struck his machine. Harkensen is a deputy assessor for Lane county. None of the cars involved in the accidents were badly damaged.

**DRUNKEN DRIVER GETS FIVE YEARS; PAROLED**

C. W. Tallafiero, of Eugene, cannot drive an automobile for any but business purposes during the next five years, he must not take liquor, he must not violate any law, and he must report to Ben F. Koeney, county assessor, each month. These are the provisions of the parole which was granted Tallafiero by Judge Skipworth after pleading guilty to involuntary manslaughter and had been sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary.

He was the driver of the car which caused the death of W. F. Smith, who died as the result of injuries received in an auto accident at the west approach to the Springfield bridge on the night of April 5. Tallafiero is alleged to have been drunk at the time of the accident, and was driving down the wrong side of the road.

**MOUNTAIN STATES CO. TO EXPAND LINES WEST**

A franchise for the building of a new power line from Veneta to Gillespie Corners was granted to the Mountain States power company on Saturday by the members of the Lane county court. The line will be 12.5 miles long and will provide power for all services in the area served. It will be a 11,000 volt line and the poles will be 35 feet in height.
