WILLAMETTE COUNCIL BACKS S. S. GEORGE IN SKIFF LETTER CASE

The Willamette Council, District No. 3, of the American Legion went on record at a meeting held at Toledo Sunday as approving of the action taken recently by S. S. George, State Commander, in the trouble which arose between him and Mrs. A. C. Skiff, of Salem, representing the Salem chapter of the American War Mothers organization.

A copy of the resolution has been received here by Dr. W. N. Dow, who will present it to the local Legion members at their meeting Friday night for their consideration. The resolution follows:
RESOLUTION
 Whereas: Willamette Council of District No. 3 of the American Legion Department of Oregon, at its regular meeting held at the American Legion Hall at Toledo, Oregon, on this 27th day of April, 1930, has taken cognizance of the controversy appearing in the Sunday Oregonian of April 29th, 1930, as well as in other leading daily papers of the State of Oregon, and at other times, relative to certain correspondence between Mr. S. S. George, Commander of the American Legion for the Department of Oregon, and Mrs. A. C. Skiff, of Salem, Oregon, representing the Salem Chapter of the American War Mothers organization; and
 Whereas: An explanation of all incidents in connection with said matter was made, and said matter given careful consideration; and
 Whereas: It is the unanimous opinion of all members of said District Council present at said meeting that Mr. George was correct in the stand which he took in his letter to the said Mrs. Skiff; over which said controversy arose; that if the language in his letter to Mrs. Skiff was either ill-advised or misinterpreted, he did all that could be expected of any honorable citizen of the State of Oregon by apologizing to her, and that in this respect he expressed frankness and sincerity; that in writing his original letter, Mr. George sought only the welfare and best interests of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliaries of Oregon, a characteristic stand which is responsible in a large measure for his highly successful administration, and that he acted with no intention to reflect any dishonor upon any mother within the State of Oregon, or upon any organization of which they might be a member;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved: That Willamette Council of District No. 3, American Legion, Department of Oregon, go on record as approving Commander George's action in this entire matter; and
 Be It Further Resolved: That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the executive committee of the American Legion of the Department of Oregon.

COUNTY WIDE CAMPAIGN TO INCREASE MILK AND BUTTER USE STARTED

A campaign to increase the consumption of milk and milk products in Lane county was launched at a meeting of representatives of producers and consumers of milk held in the chamber of commerce rooms in Eugene last Monday night. The first step in the campaign will be a series of essay and poster contests to be held at once in the schools of the county.

The plan adopted for the campaign was worked out by a committee from the Lane county dairymen's association cooperating with a similar committee from the Eugene chamber of commerce. The county agent and the home demonstration agent assisted the committees in organizing the campaign. The county school superintendent and Eugene superintendent are also cooperating in the campaign.

Funds for the prizes in the contests have been furnished by dairy organizations, milk distributors, creameries, the Western Lane cheese factory, the banks of the county, and by interested individuals.

All schools in the county will be divided into two divisions. Division one to include all schools of the first class; division two to include all other schools. Each division will be divided into three sections as follows:

1. Grades 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 to compete in a poster contest, the subject to be "Why Children Need Dairy Products."
2. Grades 7, 8, and 9 (Junior high school) to compete in an essay contest on "Health Reasons for Including Dairy Products in Our Diets."
3. Grades 10, 11, and 12 (Senior high school) to compete in an essay contest wherein they have the privilege of using both health and economic reasons for including dairy products in our diet.

Nine prizes ranging from \$5.00 to \$1.00 for best posters in each division.
 Nine prizes ranging from \$10.00 to \$1.00 to the best essays in each division.

For division one the contests will open May 5 and close May 15; for division 2, the contest will open on May 2 and close on May 12.

Rules for all contests have been sent to the schools throughout the county. Literature and bulletins dealing with the subjects of the contests may be procured at the Oregon State College Extension office in the Public Market building, the County Health Association at the Court House, and the Oregon State Medical Association at 965 Olive street, Eugene.

MRS. EGGIMANN INJURED IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Mrs. C. F. Eggimann is still confined at the Eugene hospital where she is recovering from shock and body bruises about her shoulders as a result of an automobile accident in Eugene last Thursday afternoon. Mrs. Eggimann and Mrs. Bert Doane were traveling west on Sixth street when their light coupe was struck by a heavy county truck, causing the occupants to be badly shaken up and bruised. Mrs. Doane was released from the hospital after an examination revealed no injuries.

Mrs. Eggimann was driving toward Monroe to get her husband who had gone out there earlier in the day on a fishing trip when the accident occurred.

FLYING ROCK BREAKS WINDSHIELD ON AUTO

A rock which is believed to have been thrown by some person went through the windshield of the Kenneth Tobias car Sunday evening as they returned from Cottage Grove and struck Mrs. Tobias between the eyes, rendering her unconscious and causing the other occupants of the automobile, Mr. Tobias, Robert Tobias and Iowa Carlton, all to be slightly cut by flying bits of glass.

Mrs. Tobias was soon revived and is not suffering any ill effects from her experience.
 According to Mr. Tobias, he was driving along at a moderate rate with no other vehicle in sight, either in front or behind, when he heard the crash and felt the glass shatter. He stopped at once and investigated, but could find no explanation for the accident.
