POWER CANAL CLAIMS LIFE OF SMALL BOY

Richard Hanshuh, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris. Hanshuh, of Walterville, lost his life by drowning Monday evening in the power plant canal near that place. No one saw the accident happen, but some small companions of his saw him sitting on a bridge fishing at 5:00 o'clock. When he did not return for supper that night a search was started and the finding of his fishing pole caught on a snag in the swift current gave the first clue of his fate.

Attempts were made to drag the canal for the body, but were unsuccessful, so workmen began letting the water out of the canal until it had been lowered five feet. The body was then found near the fishpole. Employees of the Orem lumber mill worked until 10:00 o'clock to recover the victim of the fast water which flows in a deep channel, making it almost impossible to crawl out if one falls into it.

The boy leaves besides his parents, three brothers and five sisters. Funeral services were held from the Branstetter chapel in Eugene on Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. Rev. Fred Hornschua, of Eugene, officiated and interment was made in the Mulkey cemetery.
