

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED REMODELING STORE AND ALSO DOING BUSINESS

Remodeling a busy store and doing business in it at the same time is the difficult problem which has been facing the J. C. Penney store in Eugene for the past two months. The expanding business of the firm made it necessary to vacate the second floor of all offices and remodel that space for store use. With this work necessary it was decided to completely remodel the building from the basement to the top of the building. The workmen went into the basement and began there by putting in a new concrete floor and making a downstairs store of the front half of the basement, while all of the large stock was carried up to the second floor. When the basement work was completed the stocks were again carried down and the shoe removed down to the basement while the second floor and the back half of the building was remodeled. This work has now been completed and the ready-to-wear will be moved to the second floor before Saturday. The piece goods will be put on the balcony with the corset department. Offices will also be located here.

The men's clothing and the women's notions will be found in the back of the store and in the basement until the front remodeling has been completed, after which the shoes will be put under the balcony and the men's clothing moved to the front of the store with notions and some women's apparel.

"It is a great mix-up now," says Homer McLean, advertising manager of the firm, "but we will have a fine store when it is finally completed."
