Newell Ashley Emery, 71, twin brother of Dr. Newton Emery, of this city, died at his home at College Crest in Eugene Monday evening at 8:00, following a protracted illness. Mr. Emery was born in Brandon, New York, on January 5, 1858. He came to Oregon from South Dakota and has been engaged in farming in this vicinity. He was a member of the Methodist church.

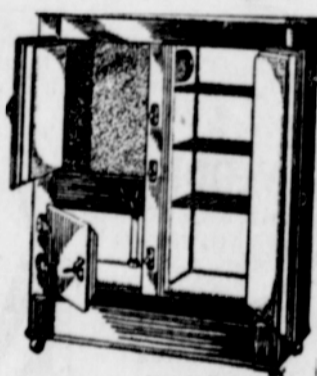
