BAND COMPOSED OF SCHOOL CHILDREN MAY BE ORGANIZED

Springfield will have an active school children's band by the time school opens in the fall if enough children care to learn to play instruments and if their parents will finance them to the extent of one lesson per week.

H. Lewis Baxter, enthusiastic band leader, who is planning to spend the next two years at the University taking special music work was in Springfield this week consulting with the principals of the local schools and securing the names of those children who are anxious to join such an organization. At a later date he will make a personal canvass of the children's parents, and if enough are willing to let their children take lessons, a large meeting will be called and a Hand-Parent organization will be started.

A similar band at Cottage Grove is also being planned.

The plan as outlined by Mr. Baxter provides for one paid lesson each week, and at least two, and probably three free group lessons each week if enough interest is aroused in the project.

The first six weeks will be occupied with a series of test lessons to determine the aptitude of the children to play instruments and read music.

The time of the meetings and the place will be determined after the canvass of the parents has been made.

COAST STAGE LINES CONSOLIDATED TO FORM NEW GREYHOUND LINES

Announcement was made last week of the merger of sixteen of the leading motor transportation companies on the Pacific Coast to form what is to be known as the Pacific Greyhound Lines. "The amazing growth of the motor coach transportation from a local to a nationwide travel industry demanded a new system of unified management," stated T. B. Wilson, president of the new consolidation, in explaining the reason for the union.

Wilson is also quoted as saying that "Improved unified motor coach service, finer equipment, lower fares in many instances, a single high standard of courtesy throughout the entire organization, are but a few of the benefits motor coach patrons will derive from the consolidation. Under the name of Pacific Greyhound Lines virtually every community now served by motor coach lines will enjoy more frequent service, better connections, and in many instances, a reduction in the cost of travel by motorcoach."

Transportation companies operating in Oregon which are included in the merger are Pickwick Stage System, California Transit company (Yelloway), Southern Pacific Motor Transport company, Pacific Coast Motor Coach company, Shasta Transit company, Pacific Stages, Inc., and Oregon Stages.

The consolidated lines will operate over 9,245 miles of route, have 695 motor coaches in service and transport approximately 400,000 passengers each month.

The total investment will aggregate more than \$10,000,000.
