

COOL SPRING AIDS SCHOOL HONOR ROLL

Sixth Grade at Brattain Leads Classes with 99.4 Per Cent Attendance for Last Grade Period; More Names on List Than Usual for Final Term.

More children have their names on the honor rolls at the various grade schools of the city this six weeks' period, the last of the present school year, than is usually the case for corresponding periods in previous years. BRIDGE DISMANTLING PROGRESSING RAPIDLY

Fully two-thirds of the old bridge across the Willamette river has been taken down and piled about on either side of the river. A few more weeks of good weather will see the complete removal of the top part of the bridge, and then the floor will be

be dropped onto the false scaffolding and taken apart.

A great deal of labor is required in the dismantling of the bridge, says Mr. Pierce. Each section of the steel bridge when being taken down means the removal of more than 40 bolts and pins, most of which have rusted so badly that they can only be removed by cutting them.
