WILD LIFE SUBJECT OF NATIONAL SURVEY PLANNED BY SENATE

An act which is believed to be the broadest and most liberal attempt yet made by the United States government to conserve the birds, fish, and wild animals of our country was the appointment recently of a special committee of the United States senate, for the purpose of investigating all matters pertaining to the replacement and conservation of wild life, with a view of determining the most appropriate methods for carrying out such purposes, together with its recommendations for the necessary legislation.

The committee has been instructed to report its findings to the senate as soon as possible, and not later than the beginning of the first regular session of congress. The committee has been given ample power to call witnesses and to secure data necessary for their report.

The activities of the committee will particularly be felt in eastern Oregon in the Harney Lake country, where the government maintains a bird refuge and where the water is evaporating so rapidly that there now remains insufficient water for the propagation of birds in sufficient quantities. Residents of that district have been at work for several months trying to induce the federal government to again flood the Harney valley with water from the adjacent rivers.

The problem of propagation of fish in the streams of the state along the coast line will also be considered by the committee, as well as similar problems in the fishing states along the Atlantic seacoast.

It is hoped that by making a nationwide survey of conditions a more or less uniform set of laws can be enacted in each of the states to regulate those matters which the federal government cannot control.

Washington, D. C., June 12.—The Aeronautics Branch of the Department of Commerce has just issued an airway bulletin describing the Springfield airport.

The airways bulletins, which are sent on request to pilots, air craft operators and others concerned with air navigation facilities, are published in loose leaf form, punched for binding, and are being issued on all airports that have been developed to the point where they can be characterized, and on which the Aeronautics Branch has sufficient data.

The front page of the bulletin embodies two line cuts. The first, or upper one, is a general map of the city and vicinity showing the location of the airport with reference to the city and all outstanding landmarks, such as principal railroads, rivers, lakes and highways.

The second or lower illustration is a close-up sketch of the airport, showing the dimensions of the usable landing area; the positions of hangars and other buildings; the location and character of the night lighting installation; the location and nature of obstructions; airport markings; and any other data which might be of assistance to those using the airport.

On page 2 of the bulletin a condensed summary of the facilities installed, the owner and operator of the airport, its latitude and longitude and magnetic variation and a weather summary for the district prepared by the United States Weather Bureau.

The airways bulletins are published primarily as aids to air navigation, and as such are used extensively by pilots flying cross-country over strange terrain and who may be desirous of locating suitable landing areas. Air line officials, aircraft operators, and pilots use these to determine routes to be followed in cross-country flying, stop-over airports for servicing, night stops where storage is available, airports providing weather information and many other important features required in the systematic operation of aircrafts.
