"THE BIG HOUSE" SHOWS PRISON LIFE

Life on the "inside" in a great penitentiary is echoed, in thrills, sensations, grim episodes, comedy and heart throbs in "The Big House," Metro-Goldwyn Mayer's much heralded drama of penitentiary life, which opened last night at the Fox McDonald Theatre.
