NEW GRAVEL BUNKERS ARE BEING REBUILT

Carpenters are now busy rebuilding the bunkers of the Inter-City Sand and Gravel company which were destroyed by fire on the evening of July 5, just a few days before they were to be put into operation. The workmen have already completed the walls of the bunkers and are busy now erecting the framework above the bunkers for the heavy machinery. The proprietors of the new plant expect to have the machinery in operation within a few weeks.

The flames were noticed shortly after the workmen had left the plant and completely wrecked the structure which was built of green 2 by 6 lumber before it could be put under control by the local fire department.
