

LANE COSTS COMPARE FAVORABLY WITH OTHERS

County government administration costs in Lane county compare very favorably with other counties of the state, according to a compilation of the expenses of all counties which has been received by the state director of the budget at Salem.

Lane's total expenses, \$941,030.49, is the highest in comparison with figures for Marion, Clackamas, Jackson, and Umatilla counties, but ranks second in average cost per person, third in average cost per square mile, and first in area of the five counties and second in population.

The area of Lane county appears one of the principal reasons for the high expense total, as the average expense \$204.03 per square mile, less than half of the \$581.89 spent in Marion county, and the \$470.54 spent in Clackamas. Lane has an area of 4612 square miles, as compared with 1194 for Marion and 1864 in Clackamas.

The Clackamas county total of \$877,097.97 is second to Lane's total expense. The average cost per person in Clackamas heads the list with \$19.05; Lane is second with \$17.28, and Jackson third with \$16.74. Marion county is fifth with a per capita expense of only \$11.30.

BEANS, PEARS, BERRIES PACKED AT CANNERY

Sixty tons of beans are being received and canned at the Eugene Fruit Growers plant in Eugene each day now, according to Lee Turner, field manager for the organization. They are operating the cannery on a day and night shift now to take care of the large bean crop.

Bartlett pears were delivered at the cannery on Monday for the first time this season and a large pack of this fruit is expected.

Some evergreen berries have been delivered, but the bulk of these will not be brought in for at least ten days.

The market prospects for Oregon canned goods are very favorable this year, according to J. O. Holt, manager. The drought in the middle west and eastern states has greatly reduced the supply of fruit and vegetables for the canneries in those regions with the result that they are placing orders with Pacific coast firms.

LANE COUNTY RECEIVES SHARE OF LIQUOR FINES

Lane county became the richer financially last week by \$2,000 when she received word from the state treasurer for her share of the fines for violations of the liquor and fire laws amounted to that sum. Fines levied against the violators of the liquor laws netted the county \$1950.

Of this sum one-half will be turned over to the prohibition fund and the other will go to the general fund of the county. After each of the counties in the state have collectively paid \$50,000 into the prohibition fund they are then permitted to retain all fines within the county instead of turning them over to the state as formerly.

There is, however, a catch in the story. Only \$850 of the fines have been paid, the other payments are pending appeals and other actions, while still others may be forced to work out their fines in the county jail.
