A JOB FOR THE TALKIES

The talkies might be the greatest influence in this country for the standardization of speech. So far gangster or high-brow language is about all they have given us but the opportunity is theirs. English in this country is spoken in a good many different ways even by well educated people from different sections. We have southern, New England, eastern, middle western and western dialects. While we think we are nearest to correct pronunciation on the Pacific coast there is no doubt but that each section differs materially from what might be termed pure English. Rapid transportation and the radio have done much to standardize our speech. The talkie, if it will, can teach us the same English language from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

It appears that the issue in this campaign may be the abolition of the game commission instead of the public service commission. If a commission cannot discharge an employee without being recalled there seems no need to have such a commission. If there is to be no authority, no honor or no pay attached to the job of commissioner then the job's a joke.

Now we are being told that Mr. Meier is the man who secured the tariff on lumber. If someone can only show he passed the farm relief bill the set up will be complete.

Lumber mills of the northwest are now operating at less than 50 per cent of capacity. Orders are only five or six per cent more than the cut so stocks are being reduced slowly, according to reports of the West Coast Lumbermen's association. However, if the lumbermen could turn the stocks in their yards into money the situation would not be so bad.

THE COST OF WAR

We are accustomed to think of war only in terms of the loss of life and of property while the conflict is still raging. But there are other costs which will continue for generations after the fighting is over.

One of these is the cost of caring for the injured and disabled veterans and their dependents. The policy of the United States has always been a liberal one, and doubtless always will continue to be. It constitutes a burden upon the people, however, which is actually greater than any other single item of public expenditure.

Another post-war item which runs on for years is the interest on the public debt created by war, the repayment of the principal of the money borrowed for war purposes.

And after every war there is always, inevitably, such a continuance of the military spirit that the army and navy never get back to the same size and cost as before the war.

The present cost of running the United States, counting federal expenditures alone is \$3,976,141,651 a year. These are the figures for the fiscal year which ends on June 30 this year. More than two-thirds of this stupendous total is covered by the three post-war items of war costs enumerated above. Principal and interest on the public debt cost us \$1,279,894,100; care of veterans of former wars ran to \$757,044,485; military and naval expenditures totalled \$692,399,804. Those make a grand total of \$2,729,338,389.

That is what the last war is still costing us a year, nearly twelve years after it was finished! Only a small proportion of these annual charges are on account of previous wars.

"The American people should understand that current expenditures on strictly military activities of the army and navy constitute the largest military budget of any nation in the world today, and at a time when there is less real danger of extensive disturbance to peace than at any time in more than half a century." The words are President Hoover's.

Is it any wonder that other nations, viewing these tremendous expenditures for war in time of peace, laugh up their sleeves at us when we protest that we are a peace-loving people?

It costs each man, woman and child in the United States about \$31.66 a year to pay for the running of the national government. That is an average of about \$168 a year per family. Out of this, \$112.50 is to pay for war.

That is why every effort to agree with other nations to reduce navies is important to every American citizen. That is why we cannot spend as much money as we should on new roads, improvement of waterways, the development of our national resources generally.
