P. H. Emery sat as judge in the case and heard the arguments as presented by Kenneth Tobias for the prosecution, and by Rev. Mulholland for the defense. Norton Pengra acted as bailiff.

Following the trial a program of readings by Mrs. Frances Zachry, Mrs. Norton Pengra, and Mrs. Mulholland, and a group of vocal solos by Norton Pengra and Paul Frese was presented.

Many beautiful flowers were presented to the local couple and an electric waffle iron was given them by the group. Earlier in the day they received pieces of silverware from each of their children.

The gathering dispersed at a late hour following the serving of refreshments consisting of hot chocolate.

Mr. and Mrs. Frese were married on September 8, 1905 at Portland. They have three children, Paul, Lloyd and Dorothea. The family has lived in Springfield for the past seven years during which time they have taken an active interest in the work of the Baptist church.

LOCAL SAWMILL DOWN; WENDLING MILL RUNS

The sawmill at the local Booth-Kelly lumber mill in this city was closed down on Saturday and the mill at Wendling was started again on Monday of this week after a two weeks' shut-down. Lumber orders do not warrant the operation of both of the mills at the same time yet, so one is operated for a while and then closed down while the other one is in operation. A notice at the Booth-Kelly mill stated the mill would be closed down during the week ending September 13.

LARGE SHEEP CLAIMS ARE ALLOWED BY BOARD

A total of \$82 was allowed claimants for sheep alleged to have been killed by dogs at the meeting of the county dog control board at the courthouse on Monday.

The largest single claim approved was that of George Arnhart of Creswell who received \$56 dollars for 11 ewes, three spring lambs and one wether. B. Vaughn, also of Creswell, was granted \$20 for five two-year ewes. Curtis Veatch of Cottage Grove was given \$6 for two ewes killed and claims for 10 other sheep were not allowed.

A case from Cushman, where 10 sheep were killed by police dogs belonging to a road crew had been settled out of court it was announced by R. J. Morris, county dog enforcement officer.

GRANGE REPRESENTATIVES ATTEND FILM SCHOOL

Thirty-seven members of Lane county granges which have electricity in their grange halls attended the school held at Eugene last week to instruct operators in the use of the new portable projector which has been purchased for grange entertainment use. Mrs. C. S. Calef of Pomona grange did the lecturing work and County agent, O. S. Fletcher explained the various uses which the projector could be put to. Ten granges were represented at the school.

STATE ADVERTISED AT CALIFORNIA FAIR BOOTH

A great deal of favorable advertising for Oregon as a state and for the counties in Southern Oregon is being received at the California state fair at Sacramento this year where Oregon has the largest industrial exhibit on display at the exposition grounds.

The counties of southern Oregon, including Josephine, Jackson, Lake, Harney, Klamath, and Malheur, have joined the northern California counties in preparing another booth directly opposite the Oregon booth.

INDICATIONS POINT TO BIGGER AND BETTER FAIR

Even "Pee-wee" golf, condemned by scores and played by thousands, has invaded the realm of amusements and will find a place on the entertainment program at the Oregon state fair which opens its gates to the public on the morning of September 23, according to Mrs. Ella S. Wilson, secretary of the state fair board.

Fifteen counties have contracted for individual displays and their booths are already being arranged in the agricultural building. The counties to be represented in the list of exhibitors include, Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Linn, Marion, Malheur, Polk, Tillamook, Wasco, Washington, and Yamhill.

All of the buildings have been thoroughly cleaned and aired and the only problem now facing the fair management is that of finding sufficient space for all exhibits. All of the concession rights have been taken and an addition is being built to the rabbit building to accommodate the greatly increased display to be put on in connection with the state fair.

Nearly 80 horses are listed for the stake and class harness races, while more than 100 running horses will probably register for the special events in which prizes will aggregate \$17,500.

SPRAY BERRY PATCHES ADVISES FRUIT INSPECTOR

Evergreen and himalaya blackberry bushes will be destroyed in this county if these bushes are not sprayed this fall and winter according to C. E. Stewart, Lane county fruit inspector.

The red berry diseases which has completely destroyed the crop in Marion county is reported moving south and is likely to attack the berries

here next year, he says.

The berries hit by the diseases turned red when about three-fourth grown and do not ripen. The pest is a microscopic insect which feeds on the buds of the berries. Growers are advised to thoroughly spray their bushes this winter with a lime-sulphur solution.
