

MUSICAL COMEDY AT McDONALD IS BROADWAY SUCCESS IN TALKIES

All of the sparkling mirth, youthful exuberance and musical delight of the original musical comedy-hit of "Good News" has been preserved in the filmation of the Broadway success which will open Friday at the Fox McDonald as a new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer offering.

LANE FARM FIGURES ARE GIVEN BY CENSUS BUREAU

Lane county now has a total of 4,987 farms according to statistics just released by the census bureau at Washington, D. C. This is a decrease of 81 farms since January 1, 1925 when the last farm census was compiled and is a gain of 505 over the census figure for the last federal census taken in 1920. This is a 24.6 per cent increase during the last ten years.

A farm, for census purposes, includes all the land which is directly farmed by one person, either by his own labor alone or with the assistance of members of his household, or hired employees. When a landowner has one or more tenants, renters, croppers or managers, the land operated by each is considered a farm. Any tract of land less than three acres used for agricultural purposes, which produced products to the value of \$250 in the preceding calendar year is classed a farm.

Wasco county shows the largest decrease in number of farms during the last ten years, with Jefferson, Wallowa, and Baker close competitors. Wasco county, the report shows, lost 923 farms during the period while Jefferson lost 236, Wallowa lost 196 and Baker county lost 118 farms.

Marion county takes the lead with new farms. She has 4826 farms which is a gain of 1,145 over the past census figures. Clackamas county is a close second in the number of new farms with a gain of 929 farms. Lane county is seventh in the list of all counties in the state in the percentage of new farms for the ten year period.
