Referred by Legislative Assembly
Repeal of State Payment of Irrigation and Drainage District Interest—Purpose: Repeal article XI-b, state constitution, which provides for issuance of bonds and payment by the state of interest on irrigation and drainage district bonds.

State Cabinet Form of Government Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: Making the governor, secretary and treasurer the only elective state officers; all others appointive by governor; creating nine new state departments; abolishing all other offices.

Bonus Loan Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: Extending privilege of state bonus loans to veterans of Philippine insurrection, Chinese Boxer rebellion and qualified non-residents after becoming residents for ten years.

Motor Vehicle License Tax Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: To authorize subclassification of property, including automobiles, for taxation and consideration of use, value, depreciation for excise or privilege taxes, without specific assessments.

Motor Vehicle License Tax Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: To authorize classification and subclassification of property, including automobiles, for taxation and consideration of use value, depreciation for excise or privilege taxes, without specific assessments.

Constitutional Amendment for Filling Vacancies in the Legislature—Purpose: Constitutional amendment to authorize the filling of vacancies in the legislature in such manner as may be provided by law.

Legislator's Compensation Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: To fix legislator's compensation at \$500 for two-year term and mileage as now provided; presiding officers to receive one-half compensation allowance additional.

SUNDAY IS RALLY DAY FOR BAPTIST CHURCH

—Purpose: To provide for two additional judges of the circuit court of the state of Oregon for the fourth judicial district, comprising Multnomah county.

Income Tax Bill—Purpose: Levying a progressive income tax upon net incomes of natural persons and deducting amount received from such tax from the amount necessary for state purposes.

Anti-Cigarette Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: Prohibiting importation, manufacture, sale, purchase, possession, giving away, of materials or advertisement thereof, and imposing penalties.

Rogue River Fishing Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: Constitutional amendment closing Rogue river and its tributaries and water within three miles of its mouth to fishing other than by hook and line, providing penalties.

Lieutenant Governor Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: Providing election of lieutenant governor to succeed governor when vacancy occurs, and be president of senate. Secretary of state to succeed when both offices vacant.

People's Water and Power Utility Districts Constitutional Amendment—Purpose: To authorize creation of people's utility districts within and/or without municipalities to develop, dispose of and sell water, water power and electric energy.

State Will Build Bridge Sidewalk

Highway Commission Agrees to Put In Walk from Bridge to Present City Walks.

The state highway commission will build a cement sidewalk from the east approach of the new Springfield bridge to the city sidewalk now ending in front of the Parker garage, it was announced yesterday by W. F. Walker, at whose suggestion request for the sidewalk was started by members of the Lions club. The sidewalk will be built along the south side of the road only.

Highway engineers went over the ground yesterday, surveying the ground and staking out the course of the sidewalk. They have promised to construct the walk very soon.

The building of this walk will be a great aid to pedestrians from West Springfield who come across the bridge daily to make purchases in this city.

Question as to who should build the sidewalk was discussed locally and it was decided that the property had been decided to the state, therefore, the city could not legally assess construction costs against the owner of abutting property. After the Lions club request the city referred the matter to the state highway department.

CHAMBER COMMITTEES ARE APPOINTED AT MEETING ON FRIDAY

Members of the Springfield chamber of commerce voted at their meeting last Friday to offer the old arch at the approach to the old Springfield bridge to W. J. Seaver, owner of the Seaver Auto camp to be used as an ornamental approach to his campgrounds. The letters of the name of this city, which formerly were on the arch and which were illuminated, have been taken off.

A committee consisting of H. E. Maxey, F. B. Hamlin, W. N. Long, and H. J. Cox, was appointed to make a survey of the possible river tonnage which could be obtained here in the event the Willamette river is dredged from Oregon City to Springfield.

Another committee consisting of John Henderer, W. K. Barnell, and H. E. Maxey was appointed to consider the purchasing of more chairs for the community hall.

The membership committee was revised and now consists of F. B. Hamlin, W. K. Barnell and C. E. Wheaton.

SPRINGFIELD MAN GETS CITIZENSHIP PAPERS

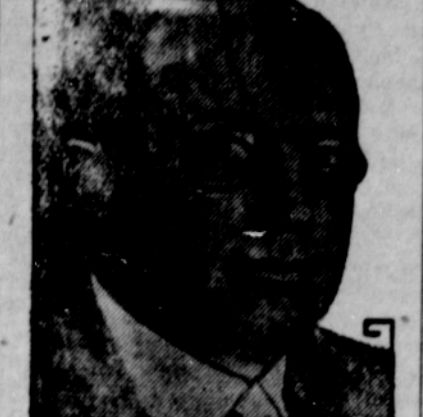

Coach May and several members of the faculty will accompany the team as will a large delegation of the student body.

Members of the first squad and the probable positions which they will play were announced this morning by the coach. They are Edward Tomseth, Hersey Tomseth, Alonzo Manwaring, and Lloyd Frese, backfield; John Lynch, center; Harold Geiger, left guard; Dean Anderson, left forward; Dalton Thursman, left end; Bert Tomseth, right end; Verrol McFarland, right tackle; and either Carl Wagner or Dorman Chase at right guard.

Substitute players named by the coach include Bill Bird, tackle; Bruce Squires and Jack Hulett, guards; Jimmie West, back; George Thatcher, Bob Stark and Paul Robley, linemen.

Three more games have been added to the local gridiraters schedule during the past few weeks. Harrisburg will be played there on October 16 and a return game with Junction City has been listed for November 21. The Thanksgiving date has been filled with a game against the University high team.
