LANE COUNTY GETS FUNDS FROM AUTO LICENSE FEES

Lane county was third again this period in the amount of money received from the state automobile license fund when that was distributed on Monday by the Secretary of State. This county received a total of \$104,230 as its share of the funds for the third quarter. Multnomah and Marion counties exceeded the Lane county receipts.

Of the sum received here \$101,326.94 came from the auto license fund, while the other \$2,903.06 was collected from transportation lines operating in this county.

The funds will be used to pay off interest on road bonds according to the county treasurer. The county now has \$1,291,100 outstanding road bonds and will have to pay \$32,277.50 interest on these for the second half of the year soon.

The total receipts from the license fund for the state were \$3,645,582.88. Transportation companies paid \$215,778.97.
