SHEEP LOSSES REDUCED BY COUNTY DOG BOARD

The increased activity of the county dog control board this year has already resulted in a great saving of money and sheep in the first eight months of this year as compared with the same period last year.

The total of 3637 dog licenses have already been sold this year in the county as compared with 2387 sold last year. The receipts from this source for the eight month period this year amount to \$7,790 as compared with \$4,909 a year ago.

Losses have also been greatly reduced due to the killing off of sheep-killing dogs. Claims to the extent of \$42,918.59 were paid out to sheep owners who suffered losses in the first eight month period of 1929 as compared with \$764.75 for the first period this year. This does not mean that the payments for each sheep killed have been reduced, says R. J. Morris, county dog officer. Last year when losses were great and the price of sheep was around \$15 the board lacked funds and had to reimburse the owners at about one third value. This year the value of sheep has dropped to approximately \$5.00 and full value allowance are usually made to the owners.

Lane county became a dog control area in 1929. Previous to that time the County Court had to act on claims for killed sheep.

ROOM FOR EXPANSION IN CASCADE FOREST RECENT SURVEY SHOWS

There are more than 23 million board feet of standing timber in the Cascade national forest covering an area of 1,026,800 acres, according to a survey of this forest completed last week by M. L. Holst, of the Cascade national forest staff, in connection with a national federal-forest survey which will be carried on for a period of ten years.

The survey showed the following things:

The sustained annual yield of merchantable timber is 150 million feet.

Three big operations the size of that now being carried on by the Western Lumber company near Westfir can be accommodated in the forest.

Two thirds of the forest's timber is merchantable and much of the rest of it will be merchantable when railroad and other transportation facilities are obtained.

Practically the only timber in the forest being touched now is that being cut by the Western Lumber company, which is about 50,000,000 feet a year. The forest officials have this company's cutting schedule so laid out that by the time the company has its areas first stand completely logged off, another stand just like it will be ready on the same area to be logged again.

Two other operations of this size could be carried on and yet provide a continuous supply of standing merchantable timber.
