NEW WALKS SOUGHT FOR CHILDREN'S FARM HOME

Contributions to the Children's Farm Home at Corvallis, which is sponsored by the W. C. T. U. groups of the entire state, are being sought now for the purpose of completing the laying of cement sidewalks on the grounds of the institution. Many needed improvements have been completed at the home during the past summer. The largest single item is the donation of a swimming pool 60 feet long and 20 feet wide which was given to the home by Mrs. Cooley of Salem, as a memorial for her husband.

A new well has also been dug during the summer to assure a more adequate supply of fresh water.

The home is made up of a central building with several smaller cottages. The home has a capacity for 140 children, but 148 are now being cared for there.

The home now has sufficient funds with which to lay 1000 feet of cement sidewalk between the cottages, but needs funds with which to complete this program.
