MANY HAVE NAMES ON FIRST HONOR LIST

More Than Three Hundred-Fifty Names on Lists for First Period; Measles Fail to Reduce Attendance Records at Grade Schools in City.

There are more than 350 names on the honor rolls of the three schools of this city for the first six weeks period which ended last week. This is a very large percentage of the entire student body and the principals at the three schools are very well pleased with the work of their pupils. The number of names on the perfect attendance lists is surprising in view of the fact that the measles scare which has been preying on the school children here has prevented several from turning in a record of perfect attendance.

The schools have adopted a new grading system this year. They are following the system being used by the state which is divided into five units as follows: I 94-100, II 86-93, III 78-85, IV 70-77, and V below 70.

City Votes Down Eleven Measures

Power Bill Income Tax Carries; Rogue River Measure Still Doubtful

The Grange bill, providing for the right to organize water and power districts, was approved by a large majority of the voters Tuesday. The state income tax bill seems to have carried and one the Rogue River fishing bill seems to be doubtful. Opponents to the closing of the river to commercial fishing are still leading by a few hundred votes and may succeed in defeating the measure.

Voters of Oregon approved the measure repealing the state payment of drainage and irrigation district interest. The state cabinet form of government was defeated as was the bonus loan bill and the legislators' compensation act. The two additional circuit judges bill was snuffed under by the heaviest 'no' vote of the entire election. The cigarette amendment went down as did the two motor vehicle acts.

Springfield voters approved of only two of the many measures on the ballot. They were the repeal of the drainage interest which drew 229 yes votes and 200 no votes; and the lieutenant governorship amendment which was given 243 yes votes and 226 no.

The vote on the other measures in the city of Springfield was Cabinet Government, yes 110, no 391; Bonus loan, yes 237, no 294; Motor Vehicle act, yes 171, no 328; Motor Vehicle act, 153 yes, no 317; constitutional amendment for filling vacancies, yes 182, no 269; Additional Judges, yes 85, no 388; income tax, yes 228, no 316; Anti-Cigarette amendment, yes 204, no 343; Rogue River fishing, yes 206, no 278; Utility Districts, yes 205, no 313.

MEIER LANDSLIDES INTO GOVERNORSHIP

Springfield Voters Retain All City Officials and Add Freese to Council; Bailey Carries City; Dr. Booth Gets Senatorship Post from L. L. Ray.

Julius Meier, running as an independent candidate on the Joseph platform, was elected governor of this state Tuesday by one of the largest majorities ever given a candidate for that office by the voters of Oregon. Edward F. Bailey of Junction City, drew second place in the election and Phil Metschan was low man. Meier has carried twenty-five counties, Bailey seven, and Metschan four.

Lane county voted heavily for Ed Bailey and Springfield gave the democratic candidate almost as many votes as his two competitors together polled.

Democrat in Congress

Senator McNary was re-elected to the United States senate, defeating Llewellyn Banks, independent, and Elton Watkins, democratic by very large majorities. W. C. Hawley was re-elected congressman from the first district and R. R. Butler will again represent the second district. Chas. F. Martin, democratic, will represent the third district, having defeated Franklin F. Korrel.

Percy R. Kelly, James U. Campbell and Harry R. Belt were winners for the three supreme court positions.

C. A. Howard was elected superintendent of public instruction again without opposition. C. H. Gram defeated his socialist opponent, James Alley, for labor commissioner.

The race for the joint senatorship from Lane and Lane counties was very close in Lane county, but Dr. Joel Booth of Lebanon came through in his home county with a large majority and easily defeated L. L. Ray, his democratic opponent. H. C. Wheeler of Pleasant Hill was elected without opposition to the senate from Lane county, as were Earl Hill, Emmet Howard, and Elwin McCornack to the legislature.

O. E. Crowe won the county commissioner post over Ross Huston, democratic, by a good majority, and Grace Schiska was re-elected without opposition.

City Retains Officials

All Springfield city officials who sought re-election in the general election on Tuesday were returned to their posts with safe margins. They are W. P. Tyson, mayor; W. C. McLagan, city councilman; I. M. Peterson, recorder; Wm. G. Hughes, city treasurer; and W. F. Walker, justice of the peace for the Springfield district. The latter two had no opposition. Fred Freese, local baker, won over Clark Wheaton for the council post to succeed M. J. McKlin who declined to run for re-election.

Tyson Thanks Voters

Mayor Tyson stated this morning that he desired to thank the voters of Springfield for their loyal support and confidence. He stated that he felt certain that a clean, efficient administration will be possible with the backing of the councilmen and other city officials who were elected Tuesday.

Tyson was elected for a two-year term to serve out the balance of the term of the late C. O. Wilson. The two councilmen were elected for four-year terms, and the recorder and treasurer will serve for two years.
