

**EXPERT TO DEMONSTRATE TREE PRUNING AT FARMS NEAR CITY THIS WEEK**

Pruning of fruit and nut trees will be demonstrated in two orchards near Springfield today by O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist of the Oregon Agricultural college, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher who has cooperated with the Lane County Horticultural society in arranging for these demonstrations.

How to prune seven-year and eight-year-old prune, peach, walnut, and apple trees will be demonstrated at the farm of C. M. Jensen one-quarter mile north of the State game farm at 10:00 a. m. Young prune, pear and cherry trees will be pruned at the farm of James W. Cooley about three miles southeast of Springfield on the Jasper road at 1:30 p. m. Seventeen-year-old walnuts will also be pruned on the farm of M. Bouchard near Mr. Cooley place.

All interested parties are invited to attend these demonstrations.



**FARMERS INVITED TO TURKEY DEMONSTRATION**

The proper method of killing and dressing turkeys for market will be demonstrated at the home of L. D. Griggs, about two miles northeast of Eugene on the Coburg road Saturday, by Chas. Dear, who is a successful turkey grower of Cottage Grove and a director of Oregon Turkey Growers. Arrangements for the demonstration were made by County Agent O. S. Fletcher.

In addition to giving the killing and dressing demonstration, Mr. Dear will discuss the importance of selecting breeding stock early, type to select, rate of development of different birds, appearance of feathers at different ages, and other factors that enter into the breeding and development of high quality turkeys. Mr. Dear has about 1,300 turkeys that are divided into five different groups on which he has kept accurate cost and weight records. Information based on these records will be given out at this meeting.

**HISTORICAL SOCIETY PLANS ESSAY CONTEST**
