Novelty—always at a premium in motion picture stories—is reported to figure prominently in William Haines' latest talking vehicle, "Remote Control," scheduled to open Sunday at the Fox McDonald theatre.

The unusual aspect of this film centers about the fact that it takes movie audiences "behind the scenes" of a radio broadcasting station, introducing them to the little-known technicalities of "ether" performances and revealing to them at first hand just what occurs when Graham McNamee, Amos 'n' Andy and other "wave-length" celebrities step up to the microphone to speak to the ladies and gentlemen of the radio audience.

DEEP AFRICAN JUNGLE SCENES AT McDONALD

Thrilling and rare entertainment occupies the screen of the Fox McDonald Friday where "Africa Speaks," an African adventure film with sound effects opens for a two day run. This film, released by Columbia Pictures, depicts the absorbing adventures of Paul L. Hoefler, Colorado explorer, on a daring trip through the hitherto unexplored regions of the dark continent. From a scenic standpoint it is magnificent, while the intimate glimpses of native life are fascinating from a news value.

Apparently Hoefler and his courageous band managed to penetrate into the deepest jungles of the big continent. Practically every type of native is shown—from the giant Wasara of the French Congo, to the pygmies of the Ituri forest, who seldom reach a height of fifty-seven inches. Religious rites and tribal dances of these natives are among the features of the production. Many of their customs, heretofore a mystery, are revealed.

He fought in the Boer and World wars; he was the boxing champion of eastern Canada; a wrestler of note; he participated in the famous Kalgooie gold rush and he has traveled in almost every country in the world.

Quite a background, but Victor MacLaglen takes it all as a matter of course. It helps, however, in lending realism to his hard boiled, screen portrayals, since his best roles are primarily only pictured versions of his own career. His Captain Flagg in "What Price Glory," his captain King in "The Black Watch" and his Sergeant Flagg in "The Cock-Eyed World" contains little in the way of colorful experience that he has not encountered in real life.

Such a role is the one he plays in his latest Fox Movietone, "A Devil with Women," opening Friday at the Fox theatre. Supporting MacLaglen are Humphrey Bogart and those three Spanish beauties, Mona Marie, Luana Alcaniz and Mona Rico. Irving Cummings directed.
