

# MEASLES EPIDEMIC HITS HONOR ROLLS

### First Grade at Lincoln Lists No Names on Scholarship Due to Poor Attendance; Entire List Smaller This Time Than for First Period.

Measles has struck a wide swathe in the honor rolls of the two grade schools of Springfield during the last six weeks period. In the first grade at the Lincoln school there are no names on the honor list for scholarship. The teacher of this class, Opal Roberts, declaring that the children had been out so much of the time that it was not fair to judge them on the work they had actually completed during the time they were in school.

The measles have kept many students out of school for several times the period of quarantine as two or three other members of the family usually come down with it at about the time the first one is ready to return to school.

### Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

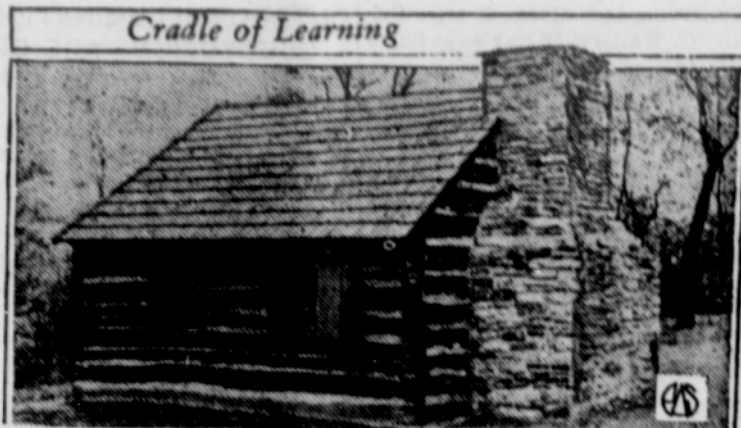
The old town pump in Jacksonville, which has served thirsty residents of the pioneer town for 75 years, is being replaced by a modern drinking fountain. The pump has stood beside the Beekman bank, oldest bank in Oregon, since 1855, and in its time drew water from its well for stage coach passengers and horses. President U. S. Grant is among the famous persons known to have used the water.

Peacock spit, one of the most profitable fishing grounds at the mouth of the Columbia river, is rapidly disappearing under tidal action. The spit is now leased by the Columbia River Packers association at a rental of \$36,000 a year.

One large sawmill, the plant of the Umpqua Mills & Timber company, is running full time at Reedsport. The plant will close for the holidays and then resume. The three other mills at Reedsport are closed for an indefinite time.
