NO THIRD PARTY

There is no possibility of a new party or a group of leaders satisfying their constituency on such issues as power, prohibition and farm relief, says Senator Borah, insurgent, when interviewed during the Norris uprising.

There are those who think that progressivism is being stifled and hail the insurgents as saviors. Truth is the insurgents are obstructionists.

Reform and progressive legislation lays not in elevating these men in a third party movement but through change in the old parties.

Former President Coolidge has summed up the real attitude of most Americans when he said "Our people are not third party minded. They believe all necessary reforms can be secured within the old parties and that they are the best instruments of government."

STATE FORESTS NOT NEEDED

We can not agree with Governor Norblad that the national forests should be turned over to the state. The state is in no position to conserve the national forests as they are now nor to administer them as at present.

With the lumber industry as it is now it would be folly to offer this timber on the market in competition to privately owned stumpage. Neither is there a demand for whatever farm land there might be found in the forest at the present time.

Judicious cutting of over-ripe timber at times when the lumber market is good, and reforestation should be carried on by the federal government in order to conserve our timber supply for future generations.

The Federal farm board has already lost 25,000,000 on wheat and \$40,000,000 on cotton trying to keep the price up for the farmer.

NORBLAD SEEKS GIFT OF SIUSLAW FOREST FROM U. S. DOMINANCE

Governor Norblad will suggest to the legislature that it seek to have the Siuslaw national forest given to the state of Oregon by the federal government.

The part of his message to the legislature dealing with forest lands follows:

"Some time ago a bill was introduced in Congress which would allow the state to select a million acres of national forest lands, the proceeds from the sale of the lands and the forest products thereon to go to the state.

"However, in view of the peculiar situation existing in Oregon, is it such an unusual request? At the present time the federal government has title to far over fifty per cent of the area of the state.
