

**REAL PROGRESS MADE  
IN 1930 SETTLEMENT  
ON OREGON LANDS**

Concrete evidence of the substantial growth in new people and new wealth in all parts of Oregon is contained in the December report of the State Chamber of Commerce, which shows a total of 138 out-of-state families who arrived and who bought \$3,312 acres of land and invested \$425,884. The annual report, just issued by Manager W. G. Ide, shows a total of 1993 new families for the year who bought 96,533 acres of land and who invested in this land, equipment, household goods and other forms of property a total of \$3,703,660. The six year period just closed by the State Chamber shows a grand total of 5,292 amply financed, practical farm families that have been attracted to this state who have purchased 262,535 acres of land in all counties of Oregon who have brought \$21,576,538 in new capital. Manager Ide points out that these 5,292 families have increased the annual purchasing power of our citizens by at least \$5,000,000.

Interesting features of the report the increase of out-of-state automobile registrations from California, which rose from 52,236 in 1929 to 57,320 in 1930, while total registrations showed a slight decrease; an increase in new families coming from California to Oregon, which was practically nothing five years ago to approximately 40 per cent of all new people coming into Oregon in 1930. During the first year's operation of the Los Angeles office of the State Chamber over 100 farms were purchased by Californians who were sent to this state. Manager Ide reports that because of the consistent advertising and follow-up work of the State Chamber in past years, even greater results may be expected in 1931.

**POWER COMPANY AD  
"BOOSTS" OREGON FARMS**

Agricultural conditions in the Willamette valley and in fact the whole state of Oregon were given some good publicity in the Mountain States Power company's page advertisement which appeared recently in the Oregon Voter magazine. The ad which was entitled "Oregon Farmers Earn 20 Per Cent More than the U. S. Average" contained some interesting facts and figures and is quoted herewith as follows:

It is a significant fact that the Pacific Coast has far more electrical development on farms than any other section of the United States. This means that Oregon farmers together with their neighbors of Washington and California are conducting their farm operations on a modern and efficient business-like basis.

"In the Willamette valley will be found many electrical farms served by this company—successful farms which yield their owners a substantial return on their investment. Oregon may well be proud of her progressive farmers and orchardists who are building a nation-wide reputation for the excellence of Oregon products.

"This company is indeed proud of the part it is taking in increasing profits for our rural customers and in greatly improving working and living conditions on the farm through supplying adequate electric service at reasonable rates."

**HUNTING POSTPONEMENT  
NOT LEGAL SAYS STATE  
SUPREME COURT MONDAY**

One of the final acts of the state supreme court before the change in the personnel which took place Monday, was to uphold the right of individuals to hunt during the time set aside by the law of the state regardless of proclamations by state officials. The decision was handed down in the case against George Burckhard of Tillamook who was tried for hunting in a closed season in 1929 when the late Governor Patterson had postponed the opening of the hunting season.

Court members ruled that the postponement by the governor was illegal as it did not specify any date on which the hunters could enter the woods.

State forest officials, on hearing of the decision, declare that they cannot see why a hunter is any more of a fire menace in the woods than most of the less experienced campers.

It is improbable that Oregon hunters will have to worry about delayed opening of the hunting season in the future, except in the national forests.

**INTERESTING PAMPHLET  
DEALS WITH SURVEY OF  
OREGON STATE ROADS**

A very interesting pamphlet on the roadsides of Oregon, embodying a report of the survey of the highways in this state which was made last summer by Mrs. W. L. Lawton, has just been published by The American Nature association of Washington, D. C. for the National Council for Protection of Roadside Beauty.

The booklet contains thirty-six pages and is profusely illustrated with both commendable and disgraceful scenes which Mrs. Lawson found along the highways while on her visit to this state. The purpose of the publication is to point out the effects of billboards and other commercial advertising on the scenic effectiveness and the safety of the state highways.

Many scenes of the McKenzie highway are included in the pamphlet. An illustration of the Rose Gray Tea Room just across the river has this inscription below it. "Proving that the roadside establishment can be an addition," and picturing other less inviting stands on the opposite page.

The Pacific highway between Goshen and Eugene is mentioned in the pamphlet. Mrs. Lawson states, Eugene has an unusual opportunity for a beautiful approach on the south along the Willamette river. Already there are twenty-eight boards on the last two miles, fifteen of them are organized.

Copies of the report may be obtained from the National Council for the Protection of Roadside Beauty at 119 East 19 St., New York. The state federation of garden clubs is mailing copies to all service and business organizations in the state and large numbers of them are being distributed in the east with beneficial advertising results.

**COUNTY TREASURER GETS  
FINAL LICENSE FEE CHECK**

Lane county received the sum of \$164,360.19 from the state during the year 1930 as its share of the automobile license plate fees paid into the state treasury by residents of the county. A check for \$5,128.20 representing the last quarterly payment was received from the state treasurer last week by the county treasurer. The county receives one-fourth of all the funds collected for license plates, and the state retains three-fourths of the total. The money is used for road work.

**DARE DEVILS MAKE  
"HELL'S ANGELS";  
ACES STAGE BATTLES**

An event of more than usual significance is slated for movie-goers the Colonial theatre, starting Sunday, for one week when "Hell's Angels," the most outstanding film achievement of all time, is the attraction.

"Hell's Angels" is the stupendous drama of air-war which Howard Hughes produced and personally directed at the staggering cost of \$4,000,000, and which required three years of continuous filming to complete.

It is admittedly the ace spectacle of wartime aviation—a graphic glorification of the World War in the air.

More than 100 daring pilots, including many of America's foremost stunt flyers, took part in the thrilling air battles which are a spectacular feature of "Hell's Angels."

A flying fleet of exactly 87 real wartime planes, including a giant German Gotha bomber and a German dirigible, was brought together from all parts of the world and flown in this picture.

In one scene alone 50 planes are shown in combat simultaneously. It

cost a quarter of a million dollars to put this single scene on the screen and aviation authorities, military and civil, declare it is the most miraculous achievement in the history of both aeronautics and motion pictures.

For the first time the exploits of the now world-famous Baron von Richthofen's Flying Circus are accurately reproduced, and for the first time the sensational wartime Zeppelin raid on London is depicted realistically.

Upwards of 20,000 persons took part in the making of "Hell's Angels," and more than 3,000,000 feet of film were ground through the cameras to obtain the astounding realism disclosed in the completed picture.

**PHYSICAL, MENTAL TEST  
URGED BY NEW GOVERNOR**
