**P. A. T. PILOT LANDS LARGE SHIP ON LAKE SHORE ABOVE OAKRIDGE**

Russell Cunningham, veteran pilot for the Pacific Air Transport company, is now back at his usual job, that of flying the night mail over the route between Seattle-Portland and Medford. The airplane which he attempted to fly from the Medford airport early last Thursday morning on a lone hop to Seattle is now nestling under a blanket of snow in the high Cascades near Crescent lake. He is receiving congratulations from his friends for his daring and ability in making a forced landing in the dark with a large ship on the tree-covered slopes with only slight damage to his ship and no injury to himself.

Cunningham left Medford airport about 2:30 Thursday morning and sleet on the wings of the large ship made it necessary for him to make a forced landing. He radioed this information to the operators at Portland and Medford and nothing more was heard of him until late Friday when he telephoned from Oakridge of his safety. He came to Eugene that evening where he was met by his wife and officials of the transport company, leaving Saturday afternoon for Portland.

In the meantime an extensive search had been organized and whenever the weather was suitable a dozen ships were searching the mountains in the vicinity of Tiller and the Cow Creek canyon for the flier and his ship.

Knowledge of the Cascade national forest which Cunningham gained while flying with the forest patrol several years ago is believed to have made it possible for the flier to land in the region in which he did and to make his way out unaided. He claims that he sat in the ship for two hours awaiting daylight and listening to plans being made for a search for him. The shock given the ship in landing injured his transmitter and he could not send any news to the outer world.
