Semester exams were given at the Pleasant Hill high school Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

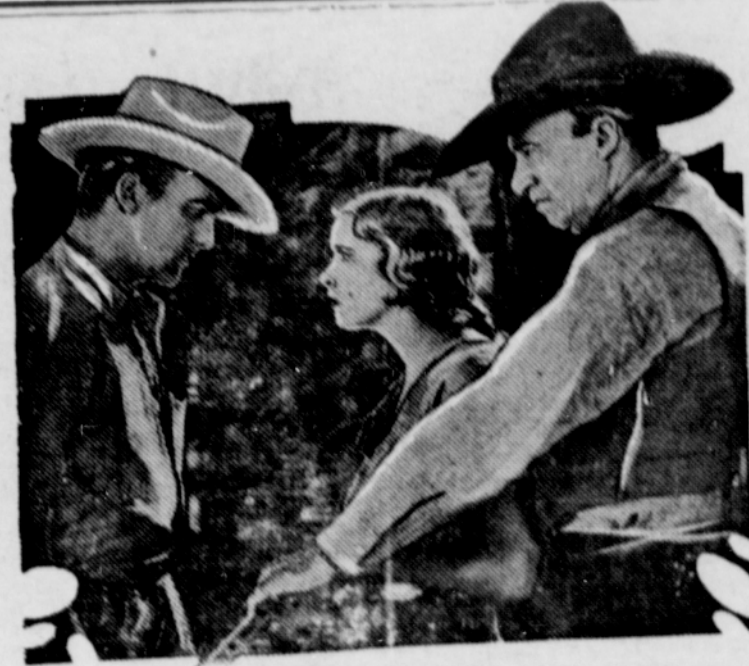

GIRLS OF 1850 DARING AS MODERN MAIDENS

What sort of an effect do clothes have on a woman's character?

Is the girl of today with her natural boyish figure and simple garments, more frank, courageous, loyal and honest than her great-grandmother of eighty years ago who wore crinolines, tight stays and numberless furbelows? Experts on the subject are inclined to think that she is. They argue that external artificialities have a definite influence on a person's makeup. But history refutes this argument. The women of 1850, particularly the pioneer women of the West, have never been surpassed for bravery and fortitude.

An interesting and romantic depiction of one of these heroines of the early West is shown in "The Lone Rider," the Columbia all-talking action film starring the daring Buck Jones scheduled to play at the Colonial Theatre on Saturday. The daughter of a judge prominent in the affairs of a little western town is returning home from the East in a stage coach. Bandits attack the coach but are driven away by a lone rider. The girl trusts her rescuer implicitly—never once suspecting that he had been leader of an outlaw band. But later, when she does discover his identity, she does not falter in her loyalty to him. Inspired by her faith, the former bandit lives up to her ideal. No modern girl could have been more sincere in her emotions nor more courageous in her actions than this heroine of the '50's.

"A LADY OF MORALS" AT REX NEXT WEEK

Grace Moore, famous Metropolitan Opera soprano, makes her debut on the talking screen as Jenny Lind, historic Swedish singer, in "A Lady of Morals," Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's vivid romance based on the life of the opera celebrity of the past, which will come Wednesday and Thursday, February 4 and 5, to the Fox Rex Theatre.

The picture deals with the career of the "Swedish Nightingale" and her sensational appearance in New York under the auspices of P. T. Barnum, pioneer of showmanship, and the romance is between the singer and a blind song composer. Hans Kraly, famous for "The Student Prince" and other film hits, and Claudine West adapted the scenario from a story by Dorothy Farnum.

The picture marks the first talking screen work of Carrie Jacobs Bond, composer of "The End of a Perfect Day," whose song, "Lovely Hour," was specially written for Miss Moore. "It Is Destiny," was composed for her by Oscar Straus, king of light opera composers, and "Barcarolle" is from the same composer, lyrics for both Clifford Grey, Herbert Stothart, composer of "The Rogue Son," is represented in "Oh Why," with lyrics by Harry Wood and Arthur Freed. Other musical details include a chorus sung by students, a Swedish pastorella by Stothart and an Italian song by Straus and Grey.

Sidney Franklin, producer of "Wild Orchids," "The Actress," "A Lady of Scandal" and "The Last of Mrs. Cheyney," directed the new production.
