## MANY ATTEND OUTING OF OBSIDIANS SUNDAY

Nearly two hundred members of the Obsidians and their friends spent Sunday at Deer Butte on the upper McKenzie highway enjoying the annual Obsidian winter outing and sports events. Bryan Ryan of Eugene was the first to finish the 12-mile men's ski race. Glenn Bessonet and Clifford Stalsberg, both of Eugene, finished second and third respectively in the race.

There was very little snow on the mountains below the Deer Butte trail. Large scrapers of the state highway department had cleared the road of snow to the foot of Dead Horse hill, which was the starting place of the races.

Climbing to the top of Deer Butte the members of the party found a large snow field ideally adapted to ski riding and other sports. The weather was just warm enough to keep the snow from melting and a wonderful view of the Three Sisters was obtainable from the Butte.

## WEEVILS THREATENING OREGON FIELD PEA CROP

Oregon's rapidly growing Austrian Winter Field pea seed crop, which last year totalled more than 4,000,000 pounds and was valued at approximately \$200,000, is seriously threatened by the pea-weevil, whose increases has more than kept pace with the increase in crop acreage, says the Oregon Experiment station.

In isolated fields where three successive crops of peas have been grown on the same ground, the crop, in the last few years, has been almost a total loss due to pea weevil injury.

"Unless the ravages of the weevil can be checked, the growing of this valuable cash crop will have to be abandoned in the Pacific Northwest," says A. C. Larson, entomologist of the experiment station, who has recently issued Station Circular 99, setting forth measures for control of this pest in the Willamette valley. Copies of the pamphlet are available upon request at Oregon State college.

The idea has been common that the seed peas themselves were the principal source of infestation of the new crop and that fumigation of the seed crop was the only control needed. Careful investigations have shown, however, that this is almost a negligible factor, Larson says, and that there are three other much more important sources of infestation. There are garden peas allowed to ripen in the neighborhood, shattered peas left on the field, and infested screenings left standing around in sacks after harvest.

Control measures must take into consideration all of these factors to be effective, Larson says, and cooperation of all pea growers is essential in keeping the neighborhood clean. Those who do not cooperate furnish weevils for their own crops as well as for those of their neighbors.

## MAIN STREET LOOKS AT BROADWAY BY EDNEST CAMO JR

"Gimme a Dime—"

Indiscriminate giving and million-dollar relief programs are making New York a beggar's paradise. Professional mendicants are flocking here from other cities.

Beggar-equipment shops selling paraphernalia calculated to jerk small change along with tears of sympathy are doing unprecedented business.

The ace of the mendicant clan is a woman who works a prominent mid-town street. She is 87 years old and moves along like a famine-stricken ghost. She has gleaned as much as \$70 a day, and has more than \$200,000 deposited in well-chosen banks.

The police department urges a flat refusal to beggars' pleas, pointing out that there are abundant relief agencies to provide food and shelter for those who are in need.

The Better Business Bureau of New York is trying to check the practice of sending merchandise such as handbags, pencils or neckties to a person who has just died under the pretense that the deceased had ordered. It is shortly before death. Relatives are expected to pay for it.

Update farmers who have received unordered articles, however, have devised a racket to beat the racket. They write back somewhat as follows: "Goods received. Do not want them. Will return them on payment to me of \$1 storage for same."

This ruse has proved a most effective check to the practice of shipping unsought goods. Since the person receiving often lives hundreds of miles away, it is impracticable for the sender to collect his goods without a stiff payment, so the farmer gets them free.

### Pussy on Parade

One hundred and seventy-four pussies purged for prizes and charity at the cat-show held at Hotel McAlpin, proceeds of which went to a home for friendless animals, there being no breadlines for homeless tables.

As a gesture of sympathy and economy, there were fewer satin pillows and silken trappings for the aristocratic cats than in years gone by. Colored oilcloth covered the walls of the cages and it was a rare cat indeed who boasted a silk pillow on which to sleep.

An innovation in this year's show was Alley Cat Alley, where the pussy who had no pedigree to speak of, but what was more fascinating—a history, meowed for prizes. The judges reported a considerable amount of cat-tiness among the entrants.
