INCREASED ACREAGE OF POTATOES CERTAIN

Low Prices for Large Crop Predicted by Market Officials at Corvallis; U. S. Yield Low Reports from the extension service of Oregon State college indicate that the farmers of this state plan to plant an increase of 10 percent more acreage to potatoes this year than they did during the year 1930. Production is expected to be one-fourth greater than last year.

Extension service officials at the college state that the potato market situation during the 1931-32 marketing season may resemble that of 1928-29 when surplus production caused extremely low prices.

The average yield of potatoes in the United States was low in 1930 and 1929 because of the drought. In the Pacific Northwest, however, good crops were harvested, especially in 1930, according to market reports.

POULTRY INDUSTRY HELD STABLE IN THIS STATE

Better Demand for Eggs Seen by Specialists; Hatchings Exceed Those of Previous Year

Greater stability in Oregon's commercial egg and chick hatchery business than prevails in other sections, is apparent from a report on the agricultural situation just released by the Oregon State college extension service. The number of salable chicks hatched by commercial hatcheries in Oregon during February was reported as 14 percent more than in 1930, while for the whole country there was a decrease of over 37 percent.

"Oregon egg producers apparently intend to profit from the market outlook information they received earlier in the season," the college economists say. "These reports pointed out that the demand for eggs is expected to improve and the supply to be less during the 1931-32 marketing season."

Because of the sharp cut in chick hatchings in California and Washington, there was a decrease of almost 40 percent for the three Pacific coast states combined. Heavy reductions in hatchery operations in the mountain group of states resulted in nearly 50 percent fewer chicks hatched in February.

Bookings of orders for delivery of chicks after March 1 are reported at just about one-half of the 1930 bookings at the same date. This applies to the whole country and the Pacific coast too, but the mountain states show a greater cut. Low egg prices and lack of funds for buying chicks are said to be the chief factors which have caused poultrymen to curtail.

The good reputation which has been established for the Oregon bred poultry has been a factor in stabilizing the demand for chicks in this state.

The commercial poultry population in Douglas county increased from 90,000 to 150,000 during 1930, according to a survey made by County Agent J. C. Leedy. At the beginning of the year the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers' association included 170 members, owning 80,000 hens, the survey shows, and the association now has 232 members, with approximately 120,000 hens.

AMERICAN STANDARDS OF LIVING IMPROVED

Significant Changes in Quantities and Qualities of Foods and Apparel Noted by Professor

Some interesting facts concerning the foods we eat and the changes which we are making in the quantity of the various items that go to make up our food supply are contained in a statement recently issued by Professor N. H. Comish of economics and sociology at Oregon State college.

In foods for instance, Dr. Comish points out that the per capita consumption of flour has fallen in the past 30 years from 224 to 176 pounds. Corn has decreased from 129 to 46 pounds, beef from 67 pounds to 62 pounds and rye flour from 7 pounds to 2.6 pounds.

The consumption of sugar, on the other hand, has grown in 30 years from 68 pounds to 109 pounds per capita. In the same time, the use of fruits has increased from 173 to 178 pounds. Tobacco consumption has risen from 5.8 pounds to 7.3 pounds per capita, and approximately 12 percent more milk is being used now than 30 years ago. Most noticeable of all has been the increased consumption of vegetable oils, which in 1930 was 61 percent greater than in 1920.

The quality of many of these commodities has also changed for the better, Dr. Comish says. Better quality fruits and vegetables are coming to the American dining table now than in 1830, and more first-class eggs, butter, nuts and similar foods are consumed.

The higher living standards are manifest in clothes, houses and furniture furnishings, vehicles and entertainments, Dr. Comish points out.

WEED MACHINERY IS GIVEN DEMONSTRATION

Many of the latest weed control machines now being marketed to aid farmers in killing weeds on their farms were demonstrated on the Allen Andrews farm north of Eugene yesterday by the Chipman Chemical company under the auspices of the Lane County Agricultural agent.

Machinery for dusting and spraying obnoxious weeds with chemicals were shown in actual operation. Many Lane county farmers have purchased quantities of calcium chloride and atlatide for weed killing purposes on their farms during the past year.
