LANE WOOD SHOW PLANS ELABORATE

Chamber of Commerce Sponsors Interesting Display with Assistance of Others

DATES APRIL 23 TO 25

Many Known and Unusual Uses of Wood to be Demonstrated to People

Under the active direction of George Pearson, who was in charge of the wood show last year, details of the 2nd Annual Lane County Wood Products show are rapidly taking shape. The wood show this year is being sponsored by the lumber committee of the Eugene chamber of commerce, assisted by the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, and with the active cooperation of the various service clubs, the Obsidians, the Boy Scouts, The Daughters of the American Revolution are particularly interesting themselves in the success of the pioneer relics section of the show.

Through the cooperation of the forest service, one of the special displays this year will be a "Know and Identify Your Lane County Trees" section, with a tree of each variety, samples of its wood, bark, etc., data as to its chief virtues, commercial uses, special uses, quantity in the county. They will be so arranged as to permit each visitor to test his own ability of name and identify each. It is asserted that at least a few of each variety that is of commercial importance to the state are to be found somewhere in Lane county, though considerable argument has developed in regard to specimens of Myrtle Wood and Port Orford cedar. A woodsman of the coast section asserts that he can take the doubters to several specimens of each. It is probable that data on the largest specimens of each variety known to have been cut in the county, the oldest according to rings counted, where and by whom, will also be assembled. The arguments here seem to center around whether Paul Bunyan's activities in Lane should be cited. Information is also desired on the largest and tallest now known of as standing in the county.

In connection with this exhibit, it is intended to feature not only known local uses, but also little known and unusual uses, unexploited uses, and possible new uses, particularly along the lines of finished products, novelties, and such things of wood as might be made available to tourists as souvenirs of Lane county—uses which would furnish a certain amount of employment, and at the same time perhaps aid in a more general recognition of the beauty and virtues of wood. A single unexploited or new use of wood might readily compensate for the cost of a dozen wood shows. A better knowledge of such virtues and possibilities of our woods might open new markets for certain selected and choice grain marked woods that are now not even saved, because of difficulty in drying with the regular mill run. Such considerations as these were paramount in Mr. Pearson's decision to accent the importance of knowing the characteristics, and virtues of each variety, and this division of the wood show promises to be one of unusual interest.

The second division will be composed of exhibits of building material and other wood raw material; the third will deal with good design in wood, home modernizing, and the fourth will be made up of exhibits of interior finish and the like. The fifth division will be as complete as possible collection of pioneer relics of wood—things made in Lane county in pioneer days, and things brought across the plains. The sixth division will be made up of manual training exhibits, and the seventh of curios, novelties, wood turnings, and wood carvings.

In connection with assembling of the material for the exhibits, it is desired to bring out everything available in the way of Lane county wood products, and anyone having anything of wood that is odd, unique or unusual, or have or know of exceptional craftsmanship in wood, is requested to get in touch with the office of Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, Miner building, Eugene. Incidentally, the second annual wood products show is not thought of so much as a thing for outside-of-Lane visitors, but as something to create a definite active local program of objectives such as to immediately begin to make visible to all and sundry, an active, functioning appreciative wood consciousness.

GRAHAM PAIGE FIRST TO CRATER LAKE THIS YEAR

The first car to reach Crater Lake rim this year was the government's four-speed Graham Paige sedan assigned to the park superintendent, E. C. Sollinsky, according to information received by the local dealer. This sturdy hill climber which bucked the snows to be first to Crater Lake is the same kind of car being given away by this newspaper in the circulation contest.

Before the Crater Lake road was opened April 1 to motorists, a motorist was made in the Graham Paige to the rim through the huge snow cuts made by the park snow plow. Cooperating with Sollinsky in the run was the Medford Chamber of Commerce and the Medford Mail Tribune. Some of the snow banks through which the car traveled were many feet above the car.

April 1 is an unusually early date for Crater Lake park to be open to motorists. Just a few years ago it was thought fortunate to be able to reach the rim by July 4.

MEIER TELLS MILL MEN TO REDUCE ACCIDENTS

Says Industry Drawing More than Proper Share of Revenue from Industrial Accident Fund

Lumbermen of Oregon were told to reduce the number of accidents occurring in their sawmills and to stop drawing on the funds paid into the Industrial Accident Fund by other agencies at the second annual meeting of the Oregon Industrial Congress at Salem Saturday night. The demand was made by Governor Meier, in the principal address of the evening.

In making his demand the governor stated that for the four years from 1926 to and including 1929 the lumber industry had paid in three and one-half per cent of their payroll and that their premiums for the accident reserve fund had amounted to \$1,641,971 while their withdrawals amounted to \$2,289,312, leaving a deficit of \$447,341. An analysis of 75,000 cases handled by the Industrial commission revealed that 98 per cent of them were avoidable, the governor stated.
