

FALL PROVES FATAL TO OAKRIDGE POWER HEAD

W. D. Pearson, President of Cascade Utilities Company Fatally Injured in Fall

W. D. Pearson, Oakridge, president of the Cascade Utilities company died Monday evening at Oakridge as a result of injuries sustained earlier in the day when he received an electric shock and fell from a power pole inflicting serious injuries to his chest. He fell 25 feet and died as a special train was being made-up to take him to Eugene.

He leaves his widow, at Oakridge; two parents at St. Helens, Washington, and two brothers, Bill and William G. at Portland.

The body was sent to Portland Tuesday where funeral services and interment took place.

Pearson was one of the men in the boat which capsized on the Willamette river near Oakridge taking Oscar Olson and Rex Brown to their deaths. The bodies of these two men have not been recovered.

Calm as The Night Life

Up in the Air The great concentration of activity in New York is graphically brought out when one compares this city with others. In Detroit, for example, factories cover acres and acres of ground.

Here they are built one on top of the other. Ups and Downs The latest design to save building space is the perfection of a type of dual elevator with two cars operating in the same shaft.

The upper car of the two is the express car. It starts from the street level and runs without stops to the 11th floor, serving all floors from that point to the top. It is automatically restricted from running downward while the lower car is running upward.

As soon as the express car is out of the way, the lower, or local car, which has been waiting at the basement level, rises to the street level and serves the 10 lower floors.

The operation of both cars is so timed that both reach their upper limits about the same time. The only great open spaces left on this crowded island are skyward, and already we have to double up to reach those. Yes, things are looking up, all right.

"City Lights" is Held Answer to Talkie Films; Best of Comedian's Offers

Charlie Chaplin's answer to talking pictures arrived this week at the Colonial theatre, with the presentation of "City Lights," undoubtedly the greatest contribution to the screen of the beloved comedian since he became a public idol.

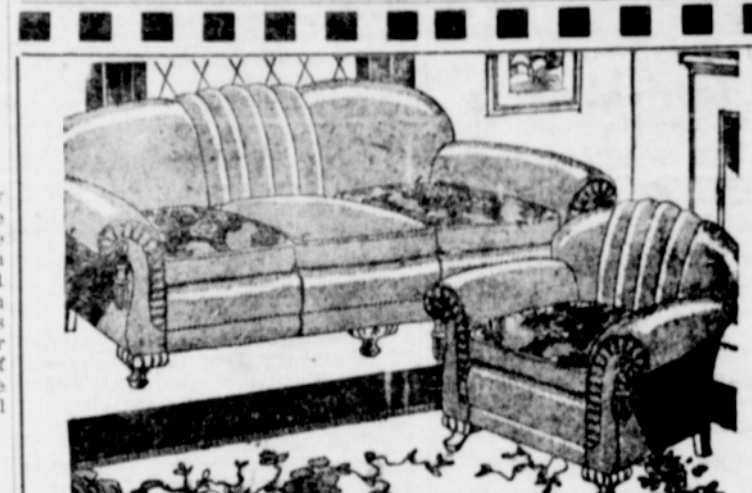

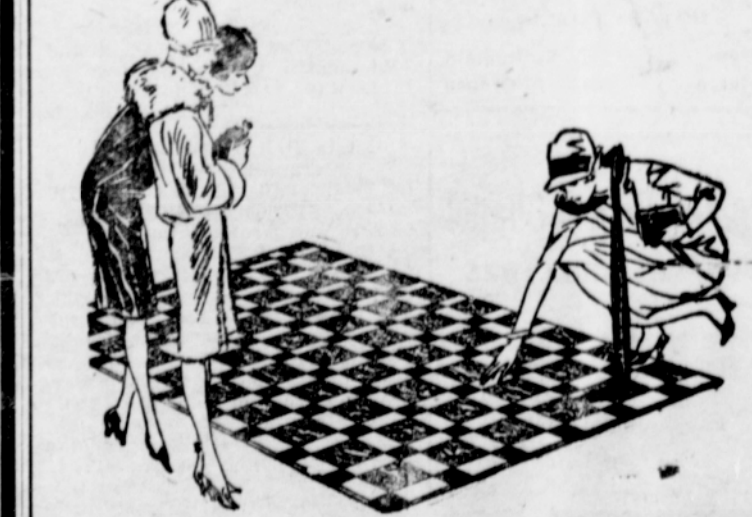
