ROSE SHOW DRAWING CROWD TUESDAY

Local People Have More Than 100 Entrants; Beautiful Blooms Exhibited

NOON LUNCHEON SERVED

Display of Pictures By Local People and Hooked Rug Work Is Interesting

Flowers, single roses, groups of three, and groups of six blooms, and baskets of various garden flowers and of wild varieties filled many long tables at the Community hall Tuesday as the judging for the annual Rose Show sponsored by the Women's Civic Club was completed by M. C. Kirkland, Elmo Chase, and Mr. Manley, rose specialist at the Chase gardens.

The blooms were grouped in seven classifications with blue, red, and white ribbons for each group.

Leading the displays was the exhibition of entries in the single group. High honors in this were carried off by Mrs. Ed Perkins with an Imperial Potentilla bloom. Mrs. C. E. Wheaton was a close competitor with a beautiful rainbow rose. She was awarded second prize. Third prize was given to Mrs. Dave Fisher for a Betty Uphorland rose. Mrs. Mary Kessey won honorable mention with a Carolina Testout.

Division Winners Given

Winners in each of the other divisions of the flower show were announced as follows:

Groups of three white blooms—First, Mrs. D. O. Fisher with a group of Frau Karl Druschki roses; second, Mrs. David Saltsman, three blooms of an unknown variety of climbing roses; third, Mrs. M. M. Male, three Frau Karl Druschki blooms.

Mrs. D. O. Fisher took every ribbon in the display of groups of three red roses. Blue and red ribbons awarded for Hadley blooms and the white ribbon was given for a group of Paul's Scarlet.

Mrs. Wm. Donaldson won first place in the grouping of pink roses with three Papa Goutier flowers. Mrs. Ella Primrose took second place with a group of Paul Nerou flowers, and Mrs. William Davis took third place with La France roses. Honorable mention in this group was given to Mrs. C. O. Wilson for a group of Carolina Testout blooms.

Mrs. M. M. Peery won first prize in the yellow group. Her exhibition was three Lady Hillingdon blooms. Mrs. Robert Pierre won second place with an exhibition of the same kind of flowers. Third place was won by Mrs. D. O. Fisher with three Sun Starr roses. Mrs. Fred Louk won honorable mention with three Lady Hillingdon blooms.

There were only a few entrants in the small rose or moss rose group. Mrs. M. M. Peery won honors in this group with a group of Cecil Bruner roses. Honorable mention was given to Mrs. Johns for an exhibition of pink moss roses.

The blue ribbon for baskets of mixed flowers was won by Mrs. Ada Carr with a grouping of pink, lavender, and white snapdragons. The red ribbon was awarded a basket of marigolds exhibited by Mrs. Carl Olson, and Mrs. John Parker was awarded third place with a basket of red and white poppies.

BUS SCHEDULES CHANGE JUNE 1

Hourly Trips to Be Made During Quiet Part Day; Morning, Evening Runs Same

SUNDAY SERVICE IS CUT

Reduction in Service to Be Effective On All Eugene Lines and at Capitol

Revised motor-bus schedules between Eugene and Springfield, which are to go into effect Monday, June 1, were announced here yesterday by T. L. Billingsley, Salem, general manager of the transportation service.

Under the new schedules the buses will operate on the same half-hour schedule they now have between the hours of 6:30 and 8:30 a. m. and from 4 to 6 p. m. Buses during the day will operate on hourly schedules, leaving here on the half hour. Evening schedules after 6 will also be every hour until midnight.

Special hours of service are also provided for Sunday. The entire schedule has been announced as follows:

Springfield Line—30-minute service leaving S. P. depot from 6:00 a. m. to 8:00 a. m. and leaving Springfield from 6:30 a. m. to 8:30 a. m. Hourly service 8:00 a. m. leaving S. P. depot Eugene and 8:30 a. m. leaving Springfield to 4:00 p. m. leaving Eugene. From 4:00 p. m. to 6:00 p. m., 30-minute service leaving Eugene. Hourly service from 6:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. Last car leaving S. P. depot at 11:30 p. m. for Springfield. On Sundays, hourly service, first car leaving S. P. depot 8:00 a. m. First car leaving Springfield at 8:30 a. m. Last car leaving S. P. depot 11:30 p. m. and last car leaving Springfield at 12:00 midnight.

The bus service in Eugene is also to be cut Monday according to Mr. Billingsley who was a visitor here Wednesday. Service on several of the lines there will start earlier in the morning and will stop earlier in the evening. Fewer trips are also planned on the longer routes.

Falling off of business and operation under heavy losses was the reason given for the announced changes.

Similar changes are being made in bus services at Salem, according to the manager.

Opposition to any reduction in the license fee for automobiles was expressed at the meeting. The feeling being that any reduction might impair the finances to such an extent that the state would have to fall back on real property taxes to pay off state road bond obligations.
