

**GAME SHOWS INCREASE IN NATIONAL FORESTS**

Officials Estimate Oregon Forests Have 80,000 Deer; Other Game Plentiful

Big game animals in the national forests continue to increase in numbers, judging by reports recently summarized by the U. S. Forest service. Over a million big game animals are estimated for the 151 national forests, this estimate being based on estimates by experienced forest officers and partly on actual count checked against data secured from state game officials, trappers, and others. The figures apply only to the national forests, and not to areas outside the federal forests. This year's increase is chiefly in deer, although elk also were reported to have increased appreciably in numbers. Very slight gains were shown for moose, mountain sheep, mountain goats, and antelope. The grizzly bear continues to decrease in numbers although increases in most localities are reported for black or brown bear.

**Antelope Increase**

One of the American game animals once supposed to have practically disappeared is the antelope. On the national forests these animals have shown a 45 per cent gain since 1927 and are now believed to number in excess of 11,000. The latest estimates show deer present in everyone of the 151 national forests. The number of deer increased, according to the estimates during the past year, from 802,450 to 877,780. Despite the many thousands of deer bagged by hunters, most of the western forests show substantial gains in the deer population. The forests of Oregon are estimated to have over 80,000; Washington in excess of 26,000 and the two northwestern states well over 100,000 deer. The national forests in Washington show an increase of 500 mountain goats and there are still a few mountain sheep left.

Ministers invited to Attend First Showing of Spectacular Production on Friday

Springfield will be well represented Friday evening when the Freiburg Passion Play opens on Hayward field, Eugene. A number of Springfield people have signed up as "extras" in the big mob scenes, and scores more will view the great religious pageant from reserve seats in the stands. The Passion Play has been brought to this district by the Eugene American Legion and is endorsed by all of the ministers in the valley.

Adolf Fassnacht, world's greatest Christus portrayer, arrived in Eugene this week with his original German company of 40 players and they lay will be presented with the assistance of an orchestra of 25 pieces, a chorus of 150 voices trained by John Stark Evans, and 300 or so extras and supernumeraries from Eugene and Springfield.

The huge pageant is to be presented on an especially constructed stage in Hayward field. In case of rain, plans have been made to move it without confusion into MacArthur Court, big athletic pavillion.

The Freiburg Passion Play is the world's oldest stage production, having originated in Freiburg, Baden, Germany, in 1264. It is 300 years older than the Passion Play which is periodically presented in Oberammergau. The Freiburg company is on its first American tour and Fassnacht, who plays the part of Christ, hopes to take it to every country in the world.

A record crowd is expected all four nights. The pageant will start sharply at 8 o'clock and will last between two and one-half and three hours. It is acclaimed as the greatest religious spectacle ever brought to this district.
