Baseball, Golf, Bowling and Wrestling Planned for Conventional Visitors

American Legion members and visitors at the state convention to be held at Corvallis August 6, 7, and 8, are assured of a full program of athletics according to athletic entertainment officials of the convention commission, Ralph Coleman, Al Keeney, Cecil Blakely and Ray DeMoss. They will include the finals in the state junior baseball league, golf tournaments, and possibly a wrestling match.

Ralph Coleman, who is baseball coach at the state college, is in charge of the finals of the junior baseball tournament to be played on the college diamond. Preliminaries are being played in all sections of the state at present and more interest than ever is being shown in the state finals, according to Coleman. The college baseball diamond, one of the best in the state, is being kept in first class condition for the big tournament.

Plans are under way for Legion members to participate in golf and bowling tournaments. Cecil Grant Blakely is chairman of the golf committee, and Ray DeMoss is in charge of the bowling contest.

The golf tournament, open to all members of the Legion, will be played on the Corvallis country club course on Friday, the second day of the convention. A cup will be presented the winning four-man team and another cup to the individual medalist. Posts wishing to enter teams are asked to communicate with Blakely as soon as possible.

The Corvallis post won the last golf tournament at Salem in 1929 and will be out to defend the championship this year. The championship was composed of Dr. Erney Quesinberry, Carl Lodell, Blakely and Bill Moyer. Lodell won the individual honors. All these divot diggers are eligible for the team this year.

This is the first year a bowling tournament has been on the list of events. Considerable interest is shown in the contest, according to Ray DeMoss, who is in charge of the affair. Several posts have already sent in word they will enter teams.

Something that probably is causing more talk than anything else in connection with the athletic program is the proposed boxing and wrestling tournament which is being promoted by Al Keeney. Keeney is endeavoring to procure a colorful card with Jack Reynolds and Robin Reed as the headliners on the wrestling program. Should Keeney's plans materialize the bouts will be held on the football stadium at Oregon State college.

COLLEGE WOULD KNOW OF FREAK BLACKBERRIES

New Strains of Small Fruit Being Developed by Expert at Experiment Station

With the ripening of the wild blackberries or dewberries in Oregon, Dr. George W. Darrow, head of the federal small fruit research work, once more sends out an appeal to the people of the state, asking that the finding of any "freak" berries or berries of unusual quality be reported to him. Dr. Darrow is now stationed at the Oregon Experiment station, Corvallis.

A large number of unusual types of blackberries, reported to Dr. Darrow as the result of a similar request last year, have been collected and are now being used in special breeding work at the station.

Dr. Darrow and other horticultural specialists of Oregon State college are also turning their attention to the development of an improved loganberry—one that will be firmer, larger, sweeter, earlier, later, thornless or resistant to disease.
