

HOOP TEAMS FALL BEFORE HI SQUADS

Games With St. Mary's Scheduled to Be Played in Eugene Friday Night

HAVE FIVE VICTORIES

Present Playing System of Districts Allows All Schools to Get Early Competition

Two victories and one defeat were added to the belts of Springfield high school basketball players this week as they began preparing for their encounter in Eugene Friday evening with the strong St. Mary's squad. This game will be the final one for the local high school prior to the Christmas vacation starting next Thursday. Another game has been scheduled for the Christmas vacation period with the West Linn team to be played here on December 29.

After trailing the Springfield team by nine points at the end of the first quarter, the Mohawk union high school team came forward to win the game Friday evening at Wendling 21 to 17.

Monday a last minute change in the Santa Clara-Springfield double header game made it necessary to play the game on the local floor, although it should have been played at Santa Clara as a return game. The Springfield first team defeated the Santa Clara alumni 26-25 in a close game. The Springfield second team defeated the Santa Clara regulars 26-7 in their encounter.

Springfield high school players now have played seven games and have won five of them. The defeat at Wendling, and a 20-19 defeat in one of the Pleasant Hill games accounts for the two defeats. The victories include one over Pleasant Hill 27-18 and four from Santa Clara, 47-11 and 36-12 and the two played Monday.

Local basketball players are getting a great deal more early practice and competition this year than usual. This is due largely to the new system of play adopted for the district. Each school scheduled games with whatever school they chose, whether they be in the A or B leagues prior to the district tournament in March. The result of these early games has no bearing on the standing of the teams as they enter their respective A or B league tournaments.

LARGE SUPPLY OF LIQUOR FOUND HERE

Twelve gallons of liquor were confiscated Saturday afternoon when prohibition officers raided the Steve Dutchuk residence on North Seventh street. Dutchuk is in the county jail following a 60 day sentence imposed Monday in justice court in Eugene. He was also fined \$250. The liquor was contained in gallon glass jugs, quarts and other containers.

Dutchuk, who is declared to have been receiving aid from the Red Cross, and who has been working during his turn on the county highways as one of the needy individuals, is reported to have had large stores of groceries, canned fruits, cured meats, and apples at the residence when he was apprehended.

High School Stage Gets Equipment

New Settings, Lights Provided; Doorway Cut to Back of Stage by Students

A total of one hundred dollars worth of new stage equipment has been purchased for the Springfield high school and is now being installed. The students under the direction of the faculty have purchased a list of new overhead flood light, a new changeable stage setting, and all necessary equipment to make this overhead when it is needed and when the old outdoor setting is desired.

A feature of the new setting, which is a heavy cloth of a dark gray color is that using different colored lights this can be made to look like several different settings depending on the occasion. The doors and windows are built with wooden frames and can be moved about to whatever place they are wanted, the setting need not be the same for any two scenes of a production.

Another improvement in the stage facilities at the school is the cutting of an additional doorway and construction of an incline leading to the stage from the front hall. This will be used in moving the piano on and off the stage eliminating the necessity of lifting it each time. The additional stage door also makes it easier for those participating in entertainments to get on and off the stage.

LANE PROVIDES AID FOR JOBLESS

Eighty Families Helped by Program of Emergency Road Work Past Week

\$803 IS PAID BY COUNTY

Report for November Shows 570 Days Labor Giving Help to 111 Families

Expenditures for county emergency road work for the past week which provided funds for 80 families totaled \$803, according to a report of W. B. Dillard, county clerk. This is on a wage scale of \$2 a day.

During the month of November a total of 570 days work was provided for 111 families at a cost of \$1141.50. In October 161 days work resulted in distribution of \$325.50 for 24 families.

The county paid out for care of the poor in November, aside from emergency road work, \$5461.86 and for widows' pensions \$1032.50.

County employes giving one day's work a month turned over \$388.38 for local relief work in November, the report of the county clerk shows.

Aid Depot Needs Men's Underwear

Many Requests Received for Heavy Underclothing for Men; Children's Stockings

It is clothing that people need more here than they do food judging by the requests which come in every day to the ladies in charge of the Springfield community relief depot on Fifth street.

To take one day as an example, Tuesday there was only one request for food and this was for groceries and not vegetables. There were, however, many requests for clothing, some of which could not be supplied.

There is a strong demand and likewise a shortage of heavy underwear and socks for men and children. Those in charge of the relief depot are asking all who have such garments which they do not need to bring them to the depot or call 197 and someone will be sent to collect them.

The depot has a good supply of men's outer garments and residents are continually bringing in boxes of clothes, most of which have been repaired and cleaned, thereby keeping the shelves pretty well stocked with certain types of garments. The relief committee will state each week just what items are most in demand, hoping that in this manner it will be possible for local residents to go a long way in supplying the requirements.

OKRIDGE VOTES ON WATER PLAN

Special Election Will Be Held Friday on Proposed Domestic Use System

FIRST VOTE INVALID

Three Commissioners Will Also Be Chosen to Direct Organization If Approved

Special election for the purpose of voting on a proposal for organization of a water district for the town of Okridge will be held tomorrow.

An election for this purpose was held a few months ago and was approved by a big majority but the election was invalidated and the votes never canvassed as the Southern Pacific railroad company halted the organization of the district by means of a federal court injunction.

The railroad company held that there was now an ample water supply for the uses of the railroad and that in the proposed new Okridge water district a large amount of the railroad holdings were included and that a tax would have to be paid by the company for a service that was not needed.

The boundaries have been changed so that the railroad property is not included and another vote will be taken.

Three commissioners, Henry Cook, J. E. Paddock and Frank Singletary have been nominated. Three will be elected if the proposed water district organization is approved at the polls.

The cause of the fire is not definitely known but it is thought to have been caused by the heating stove exploding. Mr. Laird was working in the barn when he heard an explosion and hurrying to the door saw the house in flames. Mrs. Laird and two children were in Eugene and knew nothing of the fire until they returned home and found their home a mass of burning embers.

The house burned so quickly it was impossible to save anything except a little bedding and clothes that were in the front bedroom. All the furniture including piano, radio, Brunswick phonograph, electric stove, washing machine and separator were lost. Canned fruit and vegetables being in a separate house were saved. The house, a seven room building, which belonged to the estate of the late Henry Laird, was not insured. The contents, the property of Ralph Laird, was insured. Plans for the future are as yet not made. In the meantime the family are living at the home of Mr. and Mrs. P. N. Laird, parents of Ralph Laird. A large pile of oak wood which was in the wood shed, burned for several days after the fire.
