Roseburg Smears Local Players in Rough Contest on Their Floor Last Week

COACH MAY IS BACK

Interest Centers on Comparative Stand of A. League Teams of District

Springfield high school basketball team expects to meet an easy victory Friday when it meets the Cottage Grove team in the south Lane city. The local boys had a game scheduled since they met defeat at Roseburg last week and have put in some hard work preparing for their future contests.

Norval May, high school athletic director, is again coaching the team. May had a siege of the mumps and was absent from school for more than a week. During his absence, W. E. Buell, principal, devoted as much time as he could spare to coaching the team.

Eugene took an easy victory in their game with Cottage Grove, and local sports fans expect Springfield to repeat the same performance. The result may be a surprise however, as upsets are quite the thing in the present basketball season. The story of the trip to Roseburg was a greater upset than had been anticipated, although the Chieftains had been expected to make a good showing on their own spacious floor.

The Roseburg team piled up a score of 23-13 in a rough and exciting game. Two of the Springfield men were bruised in the game, but will be able to play in the game tomorrow night.

Planting of Trees Along McKenzie Highway East of City Again Mentioned

Plans for a sub-district convention of Brotherhoods of the Methodist church in Southern district of Oregon were discussed at the regular monthly session of the local group Monday evening. CALIFORNIA CLIMATE SAID NOT SO GOOD

Heavy Bond Issues Now Failing Due Makes Tax Rates Real Burden at Present Time

Lane county, Oregon, is a pretty good place to be right now, according to E. E. Kepner, who returned to Springfield Monday from a month's trip to San Francisco and other cities in the bay district.

Weather conditions in that part of the state have been very bad recently and the hills and in some places the lower ground has been blanketed with snow for some time. The days have been uncomfortably cold and the nights have been even worse, he reports.

Business conditions there seem about the same as here, very slow and a great deal of talk. There were not a very noticeable number of men on the streets of the larger cities however.

There are blocks and blocks of vacant stores and homes, however. This he attributes partially to the excessive taxation. A business property which brings an income of \$120 will probably be taxed \$200. Residents of some of those cities have been very indiscriminate in voting bonds during prosperous years, and are now beginning to pay for it.

Taxes in the bay district exceed any of them in this county at the present time, according to Kepner.

OAKRIDGE MAN GETS LARGE BOUNTY SUM

Raymond Clark of Oakridge Friday collected \$10 from the county bounty fund for five bobcats which he had killed. There have been an unusually large number of predatory animals killed on the upper Willamette above Oakridge this season. Cougars are not being found in as large numbers as during the past few years, however. The rapid opening up of this mountain timber area to the summer vacationist has led to the death of many of them, others have evidently moved on to seek other haunts.

GROCERY STORE GETS NEW HOME

W. A. Taylor Purchases Half Interest in Jesse Seavey Building, 427 Main Street

PLANS HALL UPSTAIRS

White Front Grocery to Move Into New Location When Remodeling is Completed

Purchase of a half interest in the Seavey building 427 Main street by W. A. Taylor, proprietor of the White Front Grocery store, was announced this morning by Mr. Taylor following negotiations carried on for the past week. Jesse Seavey, owner of the building retains a half interest. The transaction was a cash deal.

Complete remodeling of the building has already been started and Mr. Taylor will move his grocery business into this location as soon as the work is completed, he announced.

The freight elevator in the building will be torn out and the upstairs will be finished into a modern hall usable for civic functions. A stairway leading into the upstairs from the outside will be added.

The name of the store will not be changed, declared Mr. Taylor. He has been active in business here for the past seven years and during this time his volume has grown to a point where it became necessary to find larger quarters. By moving into the new location he will gain this desired additional space and will be able to arrange his stocks on modern display racks and cases as is done in many of the larger retail establishments.

Rumors that another building, a concrete structure, will be built here in the near future are persistent, but have not been confirmed.
