INCREASE IN SEED FLAX PROBABLE IN THIS STATE

More than 100 per cent increase in flax seed production has taken place in Oregon in one year, and there is every indication that additional acreage will be planted this coming season. Judging from inquiries being received about the crop at Oregon State college, in 1930 there were 21,113 bushels raised for seed in the state, and this had jumped last year to 46,767. One reason for the popularity of flax seed production is that there is a ready and assured market for every bushel grown in Oregon, as the Portland oil mills have to import large quantities each year. More than 280,000 bushels were used in Portland last year, most of which came from the Argentine and from other states in this country. Flax seed has never been recommended as a "get-rich-quick" crop by the college, but with present low price of other small grain and availability of advance contracts for flax seed, the present would appear to be a favorable time to add it to present farm enterprise in some instances.

OREGONIAN WRITER HAS TRIBUTE FOR KINTZLEY

Story of Last Meetings of G. A. R. Post of Springfield Retold in Newspaper Editorial

A beautiful tribute to Zachariah T. Kintzley, last member of the G. A. R. in Springfield who passed away last Thursday was contained in the Morning Oregonian for Tuesday. The editorial, evidently written by someone who knew the veteran, is reprinted here.

The Ranks Close Up

Zachariah T. Kintzley of Springfield has joined his comrades in the bivouac beyond the Jordan. There is the briefest of accounts in the news, and the picture of a lean old gentleman with white hair and scraggly mustache, and a certain directness of look. You would say, merely to look at the likeness, that here was one of the grand army—and he was. The story informs its readers that he was a member of George post of the G. A. R. in Eugene. The ranks are thinning as they did in old days, though less dramatically, when a line of skirmishers crept forward to a pine wood, and southern riflemen fired at a movement in the laurel.

"What is drama? The quiet of such a departure may itself be drama. There is a page turning never again to be lifted. And we are reminded by one who knew Zachariah T. Kintzley that for more than several years he held the charter of Springfield post, as the last of that organization, while the years came inexorably against him. They were gone—all gone. But on the appointed meeting night he made his way to the hall and turned on the lights, and produced the records, and declared the post in session. It must have been a strange scene. The dusty kitchen chairs, with which such halls are furnished, were of an orderly vacancy as Comrade Kintzley seated himself at the plain, ink-stained table and called the Springfield post to order. The charter must be held.

"There were elections to the fore, and he conducted them in lonely gravity, awarding their gifts to himself. The silence pressed in upon him, and many memories, while he kept the charter for Springfield post. That he did not keep it to
