Transportation, Not Flood Control, First Interest of Engineers Says Visitor

MUCH FREIGHT READY

Necessity of Canal to Protect Government Forest Holding Explained at Session

That the United States Army engineers now investigating the possibility and feasability of canalizing the Willamette river from Springfield to Oregon City will not interest themselves seriously with the flood control aspect of the project was the opinion expressed at the county-wide hearing held in Eugene Wednesday morning, according to W. K. Barnell, president of the

When and if the canal project is undertaken it will most likely be centered principally about the cutting of a channel between the two terminals sufficiently large to ac-Four delegates will represent the commodate the barges to be used on it without paying a great deal of attention to the natural course

Figures stating the approximate cost of the various locks which would be required on the canal were discussed by the visitors who added that wherever the canal passed through a city that city would have to provide a suitable dock built according to governmental specifications and paid for out of other than governmental funds. It was hinted that the type of dock required in Eugene would cost \$65,000 and one in Springfield
