U. S. GRASS NURSERY LOCATED AT CORVALLIS

One of three or four complete grass nurseries conducted by the United States department of agriculture has been located at Corvallis, to be operated in cooperation with Oregon State college. It has just been announced. This nursery will include from 4000 to 5000 different varieties and strains of grasses from all parts of the world by plant explorers. From these large experimental nurseries it is hoped to develop many more grasses of value to add to the present cropping systems in this country. Oregon farmers will be particularly favored now in having

POINTERS ON CORN ARE GIVEN FOR STATE FARMS

Good Grain Crop Depends Much on Acclimated Seed, Says Bressman of O. S. C.
Much has been heard of late about the possibilities of increasing Oregon's grain corn crop, and now comes E. N. Bressman, associate agronomist at the Oregon experiment station, with the suggestion to make sure of getting adapted seed and then to see that it is planted under the best circumstances for this state.

For grain purposes we are recommending an acclimated strain of either Minnesota No. 13, or Golden Glow," says Bressman, who has carried on corn breeding work at the college for many years. "Strains within these varieties differ greatly, however, and it is of real importance that the strains used have been grown in this state for several years."

The only seed treatment recommended for corn is either land-plaster or Semason Jr. The former will not stick to the seed so can only be applied with a fertilizer attachment to a planter. The latter is an organic mercury compound which clings to the seed readily. Either of these treatments has given around a 10 per cent increase at the experiment station.
Three Kernels in Hills
Rate and manner of planting have been found relatively unimportant factors provided a near-perfect stand is obtained, says Bressman. In general the experiment station has found that three kernels to the hill planted in squares of 3 feet 6 inches give good results, or if drilled in rows the same width, the single kernels are dropped about 14 inches apart in the row.

As to time of planting, Bressman advises patience, saying it is better to wait till quick germination and rapid growth is assured. About May 8 is a common planting time at Corvallis with good results. Many inquiries are received by the experiment station regarding fertilizer for corn. This crop will respond well to barnyard manure as it is a heavy feeder, says Bressman, so is an ideal crop to use following a manure application to the land. It will also respond profitably to commercial fertilizers. On land where corn has a tendency to grow rank stalks with small ears, an application of soluble phosphate fertilizer will correct this tendency and usually hasten maturity as well.

Lane Farmers Plan Increase
More Lane county farmers are planning to plant corn this year than in previous years, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent. Several farmers in the county have grown successful stands of the varieties recommended by Mr. Bressman and have quantities of good seed available.
Mr. Fletcher has the names of many of these farmers on his seed exchange list at his office in the Producers' Public market building in Eugene and they are available for use of parties interested in planting corn.

leg such extensive work centered in their own state. Another major nursery will be located near Washington, D. C., one in the south and possibly a fourth in the middle-west. Already seeds are being received from grasses collected from all parts of the world and are being planted under the direction of Harry Schott, federal agronomist.
