Most Lodge Plans Extensive Entertainment for Lane County Association Meet

GRANGE PLANS MEALS

Springfield Members to Exhibit River Pictures as Part of Public Night Program

Fifteen subordinate lodges in Lane county will gather at Lorane south of Eugene Saturday for the annual spring meeting of the Lane County Odd Fellows association. The sessions will start at 10:30 and continue throughout the day, ending with a large public program at 8 o'clock.

Extensive plans for the entertainment of the visiting Odd Fellows who are expected to number several hundred have been worked out during the past few weeks by W. I. Seales of Lorane, president of the county association, and committees cooperating with him. Members of the Lorane Grange have volunteered their assistance says Mr. Seales and will serve both dinner and supper for the visitors. Another committee is working out entertainment plans for the ladies during the forenoon and afternoon lodge session.

The morning session at 10:30 will be called together by the Association president, after which William Mitchell, noble grand of the Lorane lodge, will welcome the visitors. After a response the chairs will be surrendered to the association officers for the business session.

At 2 o'clock selection of meeting places for the Association for October, 1932 and April, 1933 will be made. The Association holds two meetings each year, one in the spring and the other in the fall with elections made at the spring session.

Reports, unfinished business, and election of new officers will conclude the afternoon session.

The evening program is participated in by many of the lodges of the county. Various stunts are put on by the various groups and a large crowd is expected at this open meeting.

Springfield will be well represented at the convention and will contribute a showing of the motion pictures of the Rogue river trip of Dr. W. C. Rebban, M. R. Irish, Prince Helffish, and Veltie Pruitt as their part of the program.

Marriages And Divorces Less

1931 Saw 307 Fewer Marriages and 408 Less Divorces Than During Year 1930

Washington, D. C., April 21—The Bureau of Census announces that, according to the returns received, there were 7,339 marriages performed in Oregon during the year 1931, as compared with 7,676 in 1930, representing a decrease of 337 or 4.4 per cent. In 1922, there were 6,538 marriages performed.

During the year 1931 there were 2,417 divorces granted in the state, as compared with 2,825 in 1930, representing a decrease of 408 or 14.4 per cent. In 1922, there were 2,522 divorces granted. There were 27 marriages annulled in 1931 as compared with 25 in 1930.

The estimated population of the state of Oregon on July 1, 1931, was 96,000 and on July 1, 1930, 958,000. On the basis of these estimates, the number of marriages for 1930 of the population was 7.6 in 1931, as against 8.0 in 1930, and the number of divorces per 1000 of the population was 2.50 in 1931, as against 2.95 in 1930.

The number of marriages performed and the number of divorces and annulments granted were furnished by the State Board of Health. The figures for 1931 are preliminary and subject to correction.

Lane county had 433 marriages as compared with 464 in 1930. In this county there were 104 divorces while in 1930 decrees granted were 141.

Multnomah county had 1,882 marriages and 892 divorces in 1931 as compared with 2,189 marriages and 1,119 divorces in 1930. It is interesting to note that over the state at large divorces are about 30 per cent of the marriages while in Portland there are nearly 50 per cent.

Various problems, such as flood control, relief gardens, and a county-wide clean-up campaign will also be discussed at the meeting which starts with a 6:30 dinner.

Reports will probably be called for from representatives of various parts of the county in regard to the improvement of highways as a part of the Sam Hill highway beautification project.

MANY REGISTER FOR PRIMARIES

City Recorder Peterson Fills Out 355 Cards; Final Day Brings 103 to City Hall

A total of 355 registration cards were filled out at the Springfield city hall by I. M. Peterson, recorder, during the primary election registration period which closed on Tuesday evening.

Recorder Peterson had a rushing business Monday and Tuesday having to devote most of these two days to this work. Monday he registered 63 and on Tuesday he handled 103 cards.

This total of 355 does not mean that there are only that many who will be permitted to vote in the primary election. A large majority of the voters were already registered and did not have to make out new cards. Those who have moved or who changed their party affiliation account for some of the cards, and many who have not voted during the past few years, for many of the others.

Persons who are not registered cannot vote at the primary election. Registrations will be permitted again after the primary election in May for the general election in the fall.
