A total of 355 registration cards city hall by I. M. Peterson, record-1931, as compared with 7,676 in er, during the primary election re-1930, representing a decrease of 337 gistration period which closed on Tuesday evening.

Recorder Peterson had a rushing business Monday and Tuesday hav ing to devote most of these two days to this work. Monday he registered 63 and on Tuesday he handled 103 cards.

This total of 355 does not mean that there are only that many who will be permitted to vote in the primary election. A large majority of the voters were already registered and did not have to make out new cards. Those who have moved or who changed their party affiliation account for some of the cards, and many who have not voted during the past few years, for many of the others.
