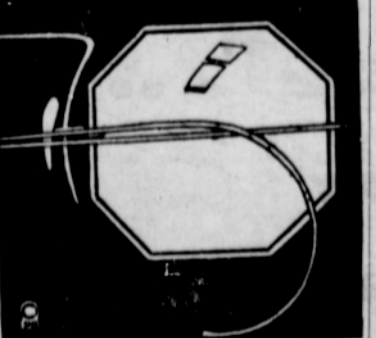

U. OF O. PLANS SUMMER SESSION

Cruises to Alaska and Hawaii Included; Campus Session Starts in Eugene June 20

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 19—Widely varied courses in many fields will be offered at the summer sessions of the University of Oregon this year, according to the program announced by Alfred Powers, director. The two regular six weeks' sessions will be held in Portland and Eugene from June 20 to July 29, followed by a four weeks' post-session at Eugene. These are in addition to the cruises to Hawaii and Alaska.

The art center, where teachers of art training will again be a part of the Eugene program, owing to another special grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York. For the past two years the University of Oregon has been selected as one of the two centers for summer work in art, the other being at Harvard university. An international authority on art, Dr. Eugene Gustav Steinhof, director of the National School of Decorative Art, Vienna, will give a course on the psychology of art.

Child Clinic Planned The clinical school for atypical children, headed by Dr. B. W. DeBusk, of Oregon, and Dr. Grace Fernald, of University of California at Los Angeles, which has gained fame all over the country will be held for the fourth time this summer at Eugene. During the first two weeks at Eugene there will be a school of athletic coaching of the major sports. Attractive programs have been arranged in many other fields, as well, including library work, business administration, chemistry, drama, economics, English, journalism, Latin, mathematics, music, philosophy, physical education, physics, Romance languages and sociology.

CHARITY STORY PEOPLE ARRIVE

Objection to National News Release from Chicago Made Here by S. P. Ware

Driving across the United States from Philadelphia to Springfield is not such a bad venture even if one does not have any money, thinks S. P. Ware, who has arrived here with his wife and six children after an eventful two weeks' journey across the continent.

Mr. and Mrs. Ware became nationally known figures recently when they stopped for three days in Chicago in search of work with which they might purchase food and gasoline to continue their trip to this city where they would be greeted by relatives.

"I do not like the kind of publicity we received in Chicago," stated Mr. Ware while discussing his trip. "That's too much like charity. I was, and still am willing to work and need to work to support my family."

We stopped a total of nine days on the trip in cities to rest the family and to look for some kind of work. In most of the places where stops were made we did succeed in finding some small jobs, he said.

The journey to the coast was made in a large automobile on which the only cash outlay during the entire trip for repairs amounted to 16 cents for a burned out light bulb. The car is still valuable, but Mr. Ware now wants to trade it for a cow and a horse so the family can have plenty of milk and a large garden.

The family which consists of Mr. and Mrs. Ware, and their children, Edith, Tressa, Virginia, Mildred, Dorothy and Pete, whose ages range from 10 down to one year are now living at Fifth and "B" streets. They have planted a large garden near the city and Mr. Ware has obtained several small jobs since reaching Springfield. He is a painter and spent several years at this work in Philadelphia.

Conditions in the East are not improving as fast as people would like to think, he says. A letter which he just received from a friend there stated that painters have taken another 10 per cent wage cut and many more are being thrown out of employment each week.

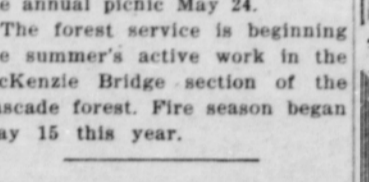
