ROSE DISPLAY IS WELL ATTENDED

Quantity, Quality of Blooms Better Than Usual Despite Poor Weather Conditions

WINNERS ARE NAMED

Elaborate Basket Displays of Roses, Wild Flowers and Other Varieties Shown

Springfield's annual rose show Wednesday was even better than those of the past years despite the late rains and postponement which was necessary according to those who have regularly visited the exhibition to view the flower growing efforts of their neighbors.

Roses, other garden flowers, and wild flowers all vied for the attention of those who visited the exhibition at the Community hall. The number of entries in each division of the show was somewhat greater than last year and the flowers seemed even more perfectly formed.

Members of the Ladies Civic club took turns during the afternoon and evening in escorting visitors around the room among the tables of flowers. Mrs. Carl Olson was general chairman of the rose show and had as her assistants in making arrangements Mrs. D. O. Fisher, Mrs. Frank Logan, Mrs. A. J. Cowart and Mrs. Clara Taylor. Mrs. L. K. Page and Mrs. C. E. Wheaton registered the entries as they were received.

New Glider To Test Sunday

Invited to See Large Action; Reconstruction Keeps Men Busy

Tests of the new glider which is under construction at the Municipal airport by students of the Springfield School of Flying under the direction of Jim MacManis, will be held at the airport Sunday it was announced today.

The glider, which has a wing spread of 42 feet, is larger than any ever flown from the local port prior to this time. It is constructed different from others in that the cockpit for the pilot is closed like that of an airplane instead of being open such as is the case with most gliders.

Several other construction jobs are also under way at the port now. A large wing for a mono-coupe is being completely rebuilt. The fuselage of the plane which was damaged in an accident in Eugene, has been completely rebuilt by Mr. MacManis.

PACKED HOUSE AT GRADUATION

Many Hear Victor Morris Address Largest Class in History of Springfield High

Every available seat including many chairs brought from the basement, and all standing room was taken at the Methodist church Friday evening by relatives and friends of members of Springfield high school's graduating class of 1932, the largest in the history of the school, with 58 members.

Professor Victor Morris of the economics department of the University of Oregon addressed the graduates and audience on the subject, "The World of Tomorrow," in which he recalled a picture of life as it has been in the past, and drew another picture of what it will be in years to come.

Pioneer life was simple, if it was not easy, he declared. Today the iron horse, or machine has brought about a radical change in living, providing greater amounts of leisure time. The problem facing the world now is the manner in which the leisure time is used. Recalling the first attempt to regulate laboring hours, Mr. Morris told of the early English law which limited the time to twelve hours which children could work in factories. There was much concern at that time, many thinking that the action would ruin the manufacturers. Today much of the work has adopted the eight hour day and even now we have overproduction, and agitation for shorter hours. The speaker predicted that within the next few years working hours will be cut from eight to six hours and from six to five days a week. This he characterized as the World of Making Leisure Time.

This brings about a more complex world he said. "Adult education is vital in such a world. A few years ago one was considered trained for life when he or she completed her college work. Today people go on reading and studying even after completing their higher education. The world changes so fast that one is hopeless behind if one doesn't, he said.

Dream and build air castles of the future, he told the students. The world needs dreamers and visionaries who can see far ahead and who thereby establish goals to strive towards.

Young people should make every effort to continue their education after high school. Those who cannot go to college should read and study good reliable books and texts.

The world is depending on the young people to analyze our problems and find a way out. We of our generation have not been able to do this, he concluded.

The program opened with a march played by Dorothy Mae Potter, and the invocation by Rev. Poindexter. Donald Anderson gave the salutatory address and William Thienes sang a solo, "The Road to Looking Forward," and Eldred Glasgow played a violin solo, "The Alp Maid's March."

Following the address, the girls quartet, Emma Trinka, Hazel Willson, Velda Bartholomew, and Lela Squires sang "In the Garden of Tomorrow." Winston Bacus read the valedictory address and June Danks sang the vocal solo, "Sing, Smile, Slumber."

Principal Gets Gift
Lloyd Freese, president of the class presented Principal Buell with a desk fountain pen set on behalf of the graduates, and C. A. Swarts, chairman of the board, presented the diplomas. Flowers were presented to most of the students before the benediction was given by Rev. Poindexter.

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Edwards Sails Monday for Edinburgh, Scotland

News clippings received here this week from Phoenix, Arizona, told of the selection of Dr. Vera Edwards Kellems, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Edwards, 155 Sixth street Springfield, as a delegate representing the American Association of University Women at the biennial conference of the International Federation of University Women to be held at Edinburgh, Scotland, from July 27 to August 4.

Dr. Kellems sailed from San Pedro, California, on June 6, and will travel by way of the Panama Canal to Scotland, her parents have been informed.

Dr. Kellems has spent the past two years at Phoenix as dean of women at the Phoenix Junior college. She graduated from the University of Oregon in 1915, and received her Ph.D. at Edinburgh university four years ago.

The delegates are chosen from among the prominent women educators in all parts of the United States.
