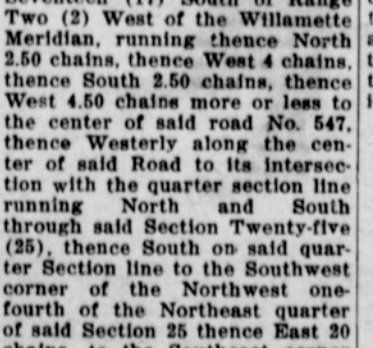

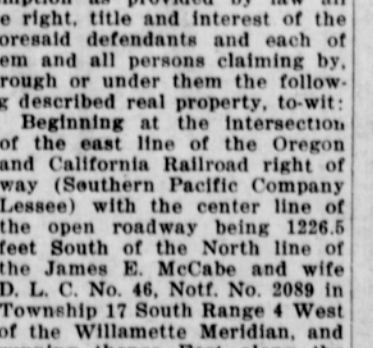

YEAR 'ROUND GARDEN PROVIDES SURPLUS

Among the 200 Lane county operators in the year 'round gardening project is one at Linslaw who expects to improve upon her record for 1930-31. Last year her garden produced vegetables and fruits valued at \$336.76. Of these she canned \$56.40 worth of vegetables and \$118 worth of fruit. In addition this homemaker stored or used fresh vegetables amounting to \$70.98 and fruits valued at \$92.28. The state wide trend toward living-at-home or "homemade living" is gaining impetus. The garden project is supervised by Gertrude L. Skow, home demonstration agent and O. S. Fletcher, agricultural agent.

SOIL TESTS FOR FARMS ARE ASKED

Many Western Oregon Farmers Seek Lime Tests for Lands; Supply Increased
Increased interest in liming western Oregon soils is indicated by more requests for soil tests at the Oregon Experiment station, and provision of more sources of agricultural lime by state and private interests.

In the month of April this year more than 100 samples of soil were tested for lime requirements by the Oregon Experiment station, aside from the tests being made constantly for farmers by county agents. The Oregon station has pioneered in the development of evidence that liming is fundamental in a system of permanent agriculture for the acid soils in the humid sections of the state.

Soil survey and chemical analysis covering the Willamette valley, backed by 16 years of plat records showing conclusively that the red hill soils are distinctly acid and in need of lime, and that liming will pay its way on older cropped soils of the main valley floor," says Dr. W. L. Powers, chief in soils at the experiment station.

Coast Uses Much Lime
Coast regions are now using lime in ever increasing quantities as it has been shown to be the key to continued production of legumes so necessary in the cropping system needed to support the great

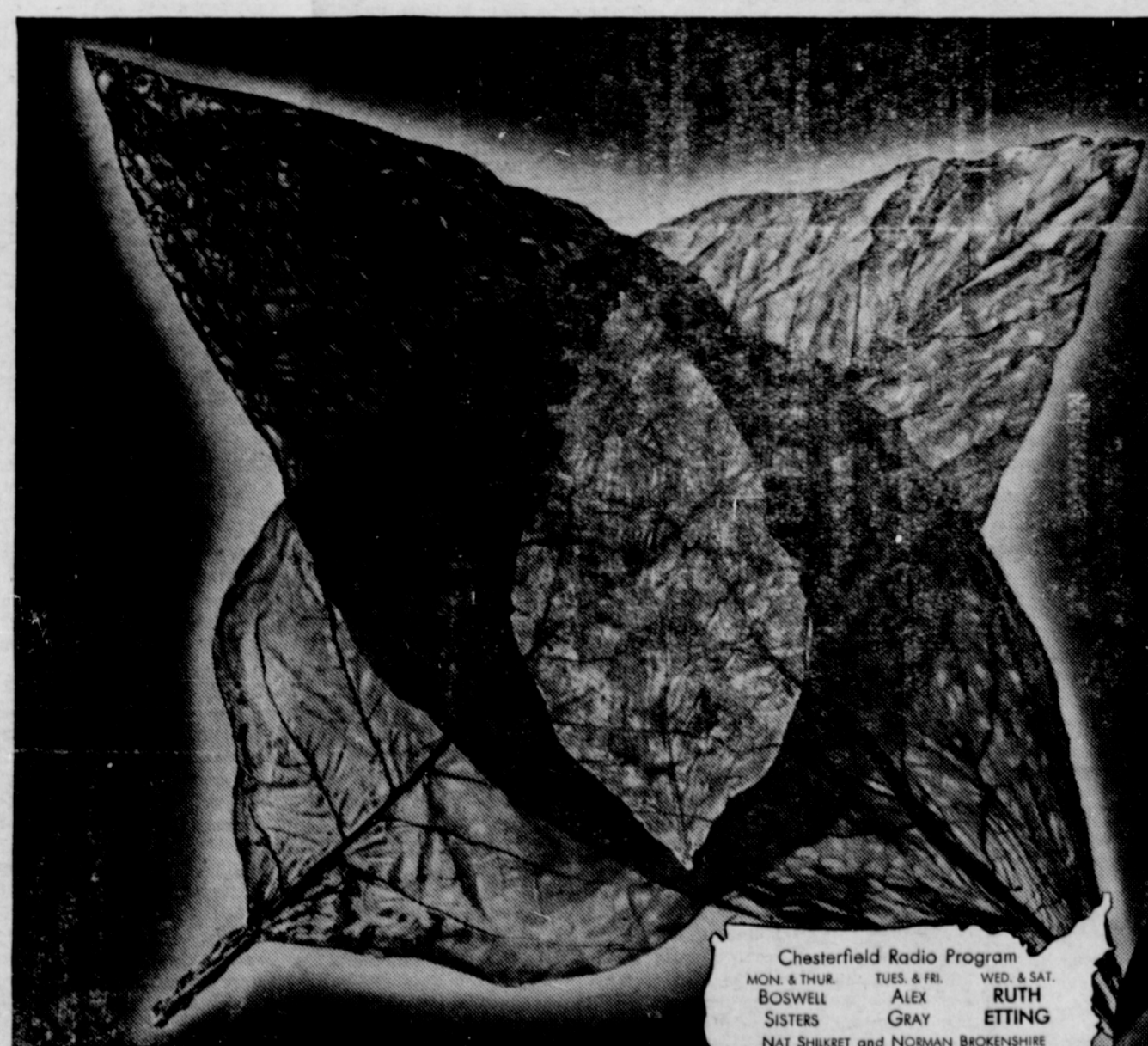
FOURTEEN LANE YOUTHS TO ATTEND C. M. T. C.
